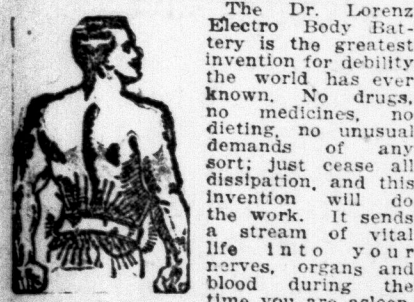

## RESOLUTE, VICTOR FOURTH CONTEST, MAKES SERIES EVEN; TODAY'S RACE WILL DECIDE

United States Yacht Throws Handicap Overboard and Wins in Fastest Time of Series — Resolute Enters Today's Race Favorite in Betting.

SANDY HOOK, July 23.—Defender Resolute tossed his 6 minutes and 40 seconds handicap overboard today and defeated the challenger, Shamrock IV, boat for boat in the fourth race of the 1920 regatta for the America's Cup.

The series now stands a tie, and the deciding race will be run tomorrow. Shamrock won the first race last Thursday, when an accident to Resolute's rigging forced her out while far in the lead. The second attempt, last Saturday, ended in no race, the yachts being unable to get sufficient breeze to take them around the course in the specified six hours.

Shamrock IV scored the second victory last Tuesday. Resolute came back on Wednesday, running a dead heat with the challenger and winning by her handicap of 7 minutes and 1 second.

Resolute will enter tomorrow's race a favorite in the wagering, her two wins having been more convincing than Shamrock's. Today's race was the fastest of the series so far, Resolute completing the 30-mile triangular course in three hours, 37 minutes and 52 seconds. Shamrock followed in 3 minutes and 41 seconds later, but the actual difference in sailing time was only 3 minutes and 18 seconds, Resolute having led across the line by 23 seconds.

Lacked Sight Finish. There was a break blow for a few minutes at a short distance from the finish, which Resolute weathered without taking in any sail save her jib topsail.

When it was over, unable to reset her club topsail and was forced to set a smaller topsail, while Shamrock, with her original rig intact, kept calm and collected and then the wind picked up again. Shamrock caught it first and crawled slowly up until she was nearly, if not fully abreast of Resolute. But when the defender caught the breeze she forced quickly ahead with her superior rig, breaking out a balloon jib topsail to aid her progress.

Shamrock piled canvas on then, breaking out both balloon and spinnaker, but the finish was close at hand and she was unable to close the gap. The steam yacht Victoria, carrying Sir Thomas Lipton, led the chorus of screaming whistles that acclaimed the victor.

A few minutes later a tiny tug was under the bow of the Victoria, its crew of yachting enthusiasts giving three cheers and a "Who's right?—Lipton?" for the British sportsman. An excursion steamer and a fleet of smaller craft followed the tug's ample and the Victoria acknowledged the cheers with three sharp blasts of her whistle. Sir Thomas could be seen on the bridge waving his cap jauntily, apparently unmoved by the fact that her whistle had been heard according to his predictions and his hopes.

Each yacht was given until 9 o'clock tonight to make for a postponement. In the event it was found it would not get into condition to race tomorrow, but at that hour no word had been received from the rival skippers, and the committee went ahead with its plans to run the race as scheduled.

A Staten Island shipyard, where both yachts had requested drydock space tomorrow and facilities for cleaning their hulls, reported tonight that both orders had been cancelled. Resolute's time allowance will remain at 6 minutes and 40 seconds, the regatta committee announced. This decision was made known to the official measurer, who went over Shamrock's new topsail and jib before the race this morning, had submitted his report.

The official weather forecast for tomorrow is as follows: "Fresh winds, varying from south to southeast, with unsettled weather, and probably thundersqualls in the afternoon."

## RESOLUTELED FROM START; LITTLE DOUBT AS TO FINISH

SANDY HOOK, N. J., July 23.—Resolute led from the start. To be sure there were times on the third leg when her lead seemed very narrow, and her chance to tie the series appeared to be seriously threatened, but in all other occasions there was no question as to the outcome of the race, provided the defender's rigging held.

Again the start had to be postponed.

## BELFAST RIOTS CONTINUING, BUT LESS FREQUENT

Catholic Bishop Demands Protection in Telegram To Chief Secretary.

MOB ATTACKS CHURCH. BELFAST, July 23.—Late tonight a mob attacked St. Matthew's Catholic Church. It ignored warning to disperse, and the troops fired repeatedly.

The rioting continues. BELFAST, July 23.—Although comparative quiet has prevailed in Belfast today, rioting was resumed on Newton Road shortly after 8 o'clock this evening, and riotous scenes were witnessed in the vicinity of Dea street, where a large party of rioters were ransacked. The police made five arrests.

The St. Matthew's Catholic Church in Ballymacart, a suburb, was occupied by the military. At the request of the bishop, the military were ordered to disperse the mob. The rioters were killed since the rioting began. Order was restored in the disturbed area early this morning.

## DEPUTY-REEVE OF OSPREY TOWNSHIP COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Charges of Arson and Obtaining Money on False Pretences Heard.

OWEN SOUND, July 23.—Hugh McLean of Osprey, deputy reeve of that township, faced his preliminary hearing today in Meaford before Magistrate Cressor of Owen Sound, on the charge of burning a dwelling house. He was committed for trial at the coming of the court.

This afternoon a similar charge was heard based on the fact that his automobile was burned between Fiesherston and Eugene. The house was burned in October, 1918, and the auto in November, 1917. Crown Attorney Dyer prosecuted.

## FATAL ACCIDENT, INQUEST, VERDICT LESS THAN 5 HOURS

Aged Man Killed Instantly by C. P. R. Freight Near Ingersoll.

INGERSOLL, July 23.—Struck by a C. P. R. way freight, near the first crossing west of the corporation limits in West Oxford Township, James Robinson, an old resident of the town, received injuries about 2 o'clock this afternoon from which he died almost instantly.

Hidden by Curve. The aged man was walking the tracks on his way into town. He was very deaf and failed to hear the approach of the train. Owing to a curve near where the accident occurred he was not seen until the train was almost upon him. The emergency brakes were applied, but the train could not be stopped in time to avert the fatality.

The unfortunate man was carried some distance and his body badly mangled. Several of the wounds received were sufficient to cause death, the worst being to his skull. The remains were removed to the McIntyre undertaking rooms on instructions from Coroner Dr. Cornish, and an inquest opened.

Exonerate Crew. Among those who gave evidence were Engineer Conway and Conductor McBride of the train crew. They told of seeing Robinson on the track as they rounded the curve, and while the usual warning was given they could not prevent the fatality. The coroner's jury returned a verdict exonerating the train crew from blame. Robinson had remained here for about 40 years and was formerly in the employ of the Ingersoll Packing Company. He is survived by two sons and two daughters.

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## LICENSE NECESSARY FOR EXPORT OF GOLD

OTTAWA, July 23.—(Canadian Press)—Export from Canada of gold bars, gold bullion and fine gold bars has been prohibited, except under license issued by the minister of finance, until July 1, 1921.

## MORATORIUM ACT TO BE LIFTED ON OCT. 1

TORONTO, July 23.—The Ontario moratorium act will be lifted on October 1, but in the case of any mortgage that falls in between that date and January 1 the moratorium will still apply, but not later. The moratorium act was passed by the Legislature as a war-time measure to guard against any hardship that might arise in connection with owners of homes not being able to meet their obligations.
