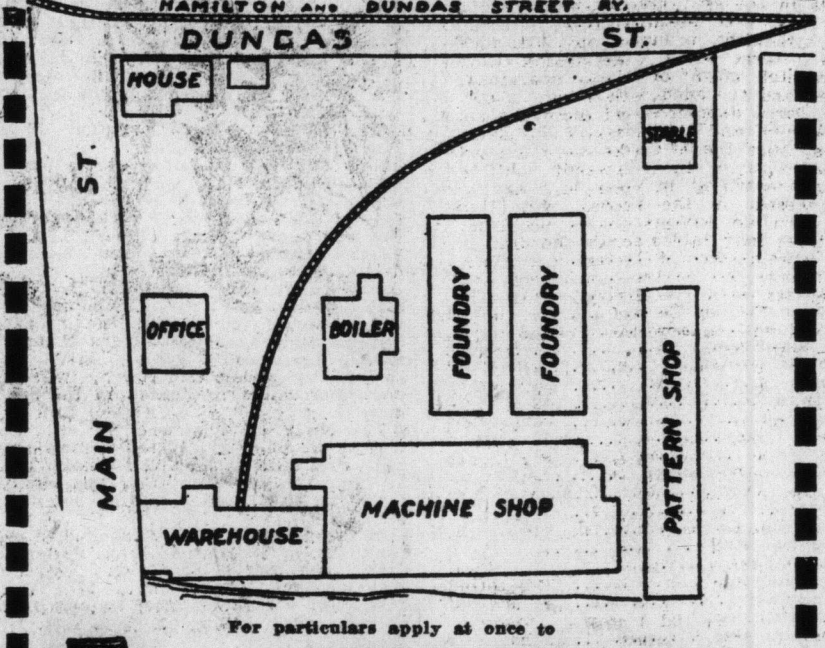

## Applications to Parliament.

APPLICATION TO PARLIAMENT. NOTICE is hereby given that an application will be made by the Corporation of the Township of York to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario at the ensuing Session for the following purposes:

(a) For prescribing the distance from the street line of a street less than 66 feet wide, on which no building shall be erected.

(b) For prescribing that there be a passageway 2 feet in width on one side of residences.

(c) For prohibiting, licensing, regulating and controlling the erection, within any defined areas on defined highways, of public garages.

(d) For licensing, regulating and governing drivers and owners of vehicles for hire, and establishing the rates or fares to be charged.

(e) For the prevention of smoke nuisance.

(f) For incorporating as a town or township the inhabitants of any defined portion or portions of the said township, subject to conditions similar to those provided in the Municipal Act for the incorporation of towns.

(g) For the incorporation of "C." of an Act Respecting the Township of York, being Chap. 190, passed in the sixth year of His Majesty's reign, by adding a paragraph to same providing that where the Corporation has reduced the assessment of lands which would otherwise be charged for a proportion of the construction mentioned in this Act, the Corporation may, in its discretion, reduce the amount of the reduction thereof to the Water Works Section, in which the lands are situated, and the amount of the reduction thereof shall be placed to the credit of the Water Works and Maintenance Account of the said Corporation, provided that the rate to be charged shall be the same as against the lands adjoining the said section.

3. For validating all sales of land made within said Municipality prior to the 31st day of December, 1918, for arrears of taxes.

4. To amend an Act Respecting the Township of York, being Chap. 190, passed in the sixth year of the reign of His Majesty King Edward VII., by striking out the words "and thereof and inserting the following:

(1) The Council of the Corporation of the Township of York may, by resolution, not later than the 15th day of November in any year enact that the meeting of the electors for the election of the members of the Council of the Corporation of the Township of York shall be held on the 21st day of December in each year, unless that day falls on Sunday, in which case the nomination shall be held on the 21st day of December in each year, unless that day falls on Sunday, in which case the election shall be held on the 28th day of December in each year.

## MONTREAL READY FOR THE G.W.V.A.

Plans Completed for Dominion Convention on March 20.

Montreal, March 11.—Plans for the Great War Veterans' Association's convention are now completed. Arrangements have been made with the Ritz-Carlton, the Windsor, the Coronation and Queen's hotels to accommodate the 600 delegates who will be present.

The resolution on "War Veterans' Day" will be presented to the convention on March 18 to draw up the resolutions which will be presented to the convention. On March 20 and 21 the Dominion convention will hold a meeting in the Windsor. The first session of the convention proper will open at 10 o'clock on Monday, March 22. That evening a reception will be given to the delegates in the Knickerbocker Hotel.

On Monday, March 22, Col. Furney, the Dominion president, will deliver the Dominion executive and the provincial presidents, will be the guests of the Canadian Club. Col. Furney will deliver an address at this luncheon.

## LOOK TO DEPENDENTS, IS SOLDIER'S DUTY

Major-General A. D. McRae, who held the position of director of supplies and transport and later quartermaster-general during the war, was in Toronto this morning. He is on his way to Vancouver where he intends to settle down and make some money. He is a soldier who has been in the service for 20 years.

Speaking of returned soldiers he said, "I think that all these veterans' organizations will finally merge into one fine solid body. I am not in favor of holding up the government, but I feel that it is up to all of us who have come through the war, unharmed and able to carry on, to make it our business to help the dependents of the soldiers. If hard times should come on I think it would be natural for the comradeship of men who were overseas to work together in union and help each other along. We must not let it get to be an 'old story'."

## GUELPH REGIMENT BEING REORGANIZED

Guelph, Ont., March 10.—(Special.)—The Guelph Regiment, which is being reorganized, is now being reorganized. The regiment is being reorganized into a new system, which will be adopted entirely under the reorganization. There will be four companies in the regiment, which will be about 600 men, with the battalion on a peace footing. Two of these companies and the headquarters of the regiment will be located at the Guelph armory, another company at Fergus or Elora, and another at Hamilton or Mount Forest. This will give the regiment the status of a city regiment.

## GEN. GARNET HUGHES HAS CIVIC WELCOME

Lindsay, March 11.—A civic welcome was tendered Major-General Garnet Hughes, son of General Sir Sam Hughes, on his return from overseas last night. He has been absent for six years in the service. A large procession was formed as the C.P.R. depot, headed by the Citizens' Band, Boy Scouts, veterans and citizens, escorted the distinguished young soldier was conveyed to the home of Sir Sam and Lady Hughes on Glenis Street, where he was welcomed by John Carew, ex-M.L.A., and other prominent citizens.

## New Brunswick Labor Men Fail to Endorse Farmer Party

Fredericton, N.B., March 11.—The New Brunswick Federation of Labor, in annual session here today, failed to pass a resolution expressing pleasure at the formation of the Farmers' organization, and cordially inviting the United Farmers to co-operate with the labor movement. It was ordered tabled by a majority vote.

## Say Dominion G.W.V.A. Will Discuss Barring of Hearst Papers

Guelph, Ont., March 10.—(Special.)—A letter was received from the Dominion secretary of the G.W.V.A., stating that the resolution sent forward by the Guelph branch requesting that the Dominion government take action to bar from Canada the Hearst publications was receiving the attention of the Dominion executive committee, and would also be taken up at the Dominion convention, which meets in Montreal on the 22nd inst.

## Against Civil Servants Being G.W.V.A. Executives

Ottawa, March 11.—That civil servants be excluded from holding any executive position in the Great War Veterans' Association of Canada is the latest demand of the veterans in different parts of the Dominion. Strongly worded resolutions, voicing this demand, have been received by the Dominion secretary, Mr. G. G. MacNeil, from many branches in Canada, with the request that they be submitted to the general convention which takes place in Montreal this month. The chief objection is raised because of the desire of the members to keep the association absolutely free of any government favoring influence.
