**HARAHAN IS
ANABLE MAN**

**New President of the Illinois
Central Railroad Has a Com-
mendable Record.**

(American Lumberman.)
Without assuming the influence which
this week to the retirement of Stuy-
vesant from the presidency of the
Illinois Central Railroad Company and the
election of James T. Harahan as his suc-
cessor, it is only fair to say through the
American Lumberman on behalf of the
great industry which it represents that
Mr. Harahan was a man of no small
importance to the industry and as such
the great industry could better have
pleased the great territory served by the Illinois
Central than that of Mr. Harahan.
As a vice-president and as such at
the head of the operating and traffic de-
partments of this great railroad system,
Mr. Harahan has been largely responsible
for the successful progress made by the
Illinois Central and has become recognized
as one of the ablest of the railroad
business. Not only so, but he has been
observed primarily of the interests of
the road, is recognized that its most
stable property depended upon the
development of industry and trade along
its lines and that such development must
be the result of a businesslike liberality.
There has been occasion when Mr.
Harahan has been criticized, but in the
main his administration has been satis-
factory to the industrial and commercial
interests which depend upon the Illinois
Central transportation. The road has
not only developed with the country but
has anticipated development, and few
within the last two or three years of the
meningering movements have come
so near meeting the exigencies of the case
as the Illinois Central.
There is special gratification to the pub-
lic in the fact that Mr. Harahan has
been for sixteen years a resident of
Chicago and in the affairs of the road
has its general confidence throughout
its history. The lumber trade in the
southern lines of the road recognize
Mr. Harahan as a southern man, for, un-
til he came to Chicago, almost his entire
career, which began as a switch-
man in Virginia, was identified with southern
roads. Lumbermen dependent upon
the Illinois Central will hope that, what-
ever the future alliance of that road may
be, its policy under the guidance of Mr.
Harahan will be a progressive and liberal
one so that the road and its patrons may
prosper together.
