

Although pulp and paper mills in Canada have for some time been operating at full capacity, stocks of news-print are decreasing. Prices of raw and of partly manufactured materials for paper-making are very much higher than they were a year ago, the cause being chiefly the increase in the cost of production, and the greater demand, particularly from the United States. Last year the cut of wood for pulp was far below normal which has resulted in a shortege at a time of increased demand and increased ost. A year ago raw pulpwood could be purchased in Northern Ontario at \$4 a cord, whereas this year the price is \$5.26 and higher.
