### ROOSEVELT HEADS

#### NEUTRAL LEAGUE

New York, Nov. 22.—Theodore Roosevelt has accepted temporarily the honorary presidency of the League of Neutral Nations, it was announced here to night. The organization was formed after the German invasion of Belgium for the purpose, according to its members, of influencing public sentiment in favor of the rights of smaller countries against "military oppression by the great powers."

Originating in Switzerland, the league now claims to have branches in Argentina, Chile, Denmark, Spain, Greece, Holland, Persia, Brazil, Norway, Sweden and the United States. Branches also were maintained in Portugal and Roumania until those countries entered the war, it was said.

### "OFF-THE-RAIL" LUNCHES FOR TRAVELERS

For the benefit of persons making ex-

ing car rates permit, a western railroad  
has inaugurated what it calls an "off-  
the-tray" service. Waiters pass through  
the tourist cars and chair cars bearing

### NEW YORK IN ROLE OF LENDER

Those who still entertain the idea that  
New York is unaccustomed to foreign  
loans are invited by one critic to pause  
and go over the budget of the miscellane-  
ous loans floated there during last week.  
The list includes a loan of \$50,000,000 to  
the Russian government; a loan of \$5-  
000,000 to the Republic of China; a loan  
of \$20,000,000 to the city of Lyons; a  
loan of \$20,000,000 to the city of Bor-  
deaux; a loan of \$20,000,000 to the city  
of Marseilles; and a loan of \$3,800,000  
to the City of Montreal.

These total \$118,800,000, and present  
considerable variety as respects the  
character of the transactions, and the  
geographical position of the borrowers.  
In addition there was the \$200,000,000  
British government loan, the subscrip-  
tions to which were paid in on last Fri-  
day.

### FRIENDLY TO CHICAGO BANK.

New York, Nov. 20.—As an indication  
of the non-existence of any feeling of  
Jealousy toward the Continental & Com-  
mercial Trust & Savings Bank of Chic-  
ago, which made a conspicuous entry in-
