LOS ANGELES - Thirty old placer mining claims in the San Gabriel river valley, relics of the days when gold mining in California was at the "pan" and "rocker" stage, will be wiped out during the next few months when flood control dam construction work gets underway.

MEXICO CITY - Mexico will hereafter bar all negroes from the country. Minister of the Interior Tejedo sent orders to all ports and border points to exclude them. The order applies to negroes of all nationalities. 


