ST. JOHN PRESBYTERY CONCLUDES SESSION At the afternoon session of the Presbytery of St. John, Mr. Back took the chair while Dr. Sutherland presented the report of the general interests committee, saying that \$27,500 had been asked last year from the St. John presbytery by the synod for general purposes and \$655 for Synod funds. He presented the allocations for the coming year which were approved, \$29,540 is asked for general purposes and \$762 for the synod fund, making a total of \$30,302 for the coming year. He said that sparse returns showed that \$42,040 out of the total of \$59,000 had been paid by the Presbytery from the Thank-offering fund.






