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SPREAD GENERAL STRIKE THROUGHOUT ALL ITALY

Fifty Thousand Workmen Hold Sunday Meeting in Milan

Milan, Aug. 11.—Yesterday was the seventh day of the general strike here. Although a state of siege has not been proclaimed, the workmen's quarters are occupied by the military forces and martial law practically is in full force. Fifty thousand strikers held a meeting yesterday and, after listening to inflammatory speeches, decided to continue the general strike. It was also decided to organize the movement throughout the Kingdom and to proclaim a one day strike in every city and town some day this week.

TROUBLES AT HOME CUT SHORT VISIT OF ALFONSO AND QUEEN TO ENGLAND

London, Aug. 11.—The sudden departure of the King and Queen of Spain from England surprised the public, with whom King Alfonso is a great favorite. It was known that King Alfonso was to make only a short visit, but he was booked for a week and the queen was expected to remain for the rest of the summer. No doubt conditions in Spain are responsible for the change in the plans.

STREET CAR MEN IN WINDSOR GET ORDERS TO SPRUCE UP

MONEY FOR AEROPLANES FOR THE FRENCH NAVY. Paris, Aug. 11.—The ministry has given its approval to a scheme for the wide development of the aeroplane to co-operate with the navy. Mr. Bardin, minister of marine, will ask parliament for an immediate appropriation of \$1,750,000.

SURVIVOR OF RIVER TRAGEDY SPEAKS OF ERNEST EARLE'S DEATH

Lad Had Held of Upturned Boat But Did Not Retain It—Search For the Body

Mrs. Robert Earle, mother of the boy who was drowned last night, was brought to the city this morning in Mr. McConnell's motor boat. She said she had just left the boat a short time before the accident as it had started to rain and her son Ernest, the victim of the accident, had helped her over the rocks and should have capsized, he said, "as I felt myself in the water immediately afterwards."

"I must have gone to the bottom, for I felt my feet touch something solid, and giving a spring, I came to the surface and held on to the overturned boat. There I found young Earle also clinging. He got excited and moved down toward me, although he was not able to keep still and they would get us. The same thing to me. He was so excited, however, as neither of us could swim, that he kept moving round till he slipped off, striking me on the forehead with his heels and I was thrown off too. I believe, for I do not remember anything after that until I was in the water. Mealey, who was rescued by Mr. McConnell just as he was going down for the last time, was still feeling the effects of the accident this morning.

Each parent as Ernest was an exceptionally bright lad and is highly spoken of by those who knew him. He was one of the choristers in the Mission Church of St. John Baptist. He is survived by his father, mother, two brothers, Robert and Harold, and one sister, Queens May.

A party consisting of the boy's father, Mr. Smith, who was in the other boat at the time of the accident, and others, went up river to search for the body, but up to the time of going to press had not met with success.

\$1,000,000 SARDINE FACTORY IS CLOSED

Plant of the Canadian Sardine Co. at Chamcook, N. B., Suspended Operations on Friday

(Bangor Commercial) Eastport, Aug. 9.—The large plant of the Canadian Sardine Co. at Chamcook, N. B., suspended operations on Friday, August 9, because of a strike by the owner of most of the stock, if not all, and the business was brought to an end because it has not been profitable.

The factory of the company is located 16 miles above Eastport, and four miles above St. Andrews, N. B. It was built a year ago and the packing of sardines was started last February, since which time about thirty hogsheads a day have been put up. The larger factories here in Eastport pack 100 hogshead a day, although the Canadian plant is far larger than any here, which would seem to indicate that the Canadian market for sardines is not good.

When the plant at Chamcook opened for business many Eastport families moved there. Now they will return and it is thought that it will be difficult for them to get work and living accommodations. More than 100 girls imported from Norway and Sweden have gone to Boston and New York, excepting a few who married farmers in the vicinity of St. Andrews. About 150 French-Canadian girls were brought to the factory from Nova Scotia and those have been going back to their homes a few at a time for the past two weeks. Fifty of them returned Saturday morning. Three large hotels, accommodating about 600 people, are now closed.

More than \$1,000,000 was put into the factory and the season's operations by the Canadian Pacific, and more than \$500,000 of this went for motor boats each, and there are ten which are valued at \$8,000 each.

CONFIRMATION IN CHURCHES ON THE NORTH SHORE

Chatham, N. B., Aug. 11.—Bishop Richardson held confirmation services at Bay du Vin Friday evening, and in Chatham last evening, and will leave today for Harcourt to administer confirmation. At Bay du Vin ten candidates were presented. Last evening in St. Mary's chapel, here thirty members prepared by the Venerable Archdeacon Forsythe were confirmed.

At the morning service the Bishop preached from John 8:12 "I am the light of the world." His address was a masterly plea for the vigorous prosecution of foreign missionary work. In the afternoon the bishop and archdeacon Forsythe conducted service in St. John church, Chatham Head.

SIR JAMES GRANT HERE; TO GIVE PUBLIC ADDRESS

Sir James Grant, of Ottawa, for years official physician of the governor-general, arrived in the city today. He has just returned after a visit to the west and will stay in St. John for two days or so. He has been in close touch with dominion affairs for years and, at his request, the city commissioners have arranged to have the supreme court room at his disposal for tomorrow evening, when he will deliver an address on Our Home and Seat of Empire.

Sir James is the president of the International Hygienic Congress of the world, which will meet in Buffalo on August 25 and at which 8,000 delegates will be present.

Honor Dr. Shepherd Montreal, Aug. 11.—Doctor Francis J. Shepherd, dean of the Faculty of Medicine of McGill University, has received another addition to his already long list of honors, having received the honorary fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons in London.
