ELECTRIC WEIGHING MACHINE.

The First One to Be Used in Canada.

Several weeks ago T. H. Estabrooks, the North Wharf tea importer and blender, received from England an electric automatic weighing machine, the first one to be introduced in Canada. This machine weighs 1 lb. and 11-2 lb. packages of tea at the rate of 16 per minute. It saves the work of one boy at each machine, and ensures absolute accuracy in the weight of every package. If it proves as good as Mr. Estabrooks is led to expect. he will use several of these machines. They are expensive, and the inventor is making a deal of money out of his work.

This and other machinery in Mr. Estabrooks's big warehouse and package establishment have been made a necessity owing to the great increase of his tea business, brought about by opening up new territory in Quebec and Ontario, and the fact that he is now beginning in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, twelve travelling salesmen being employed by him constantly on the road.
