LOST IN TORNADO

MARQUETTE, Kan., May 9.-When darkness fell upon this stricken town tonight it was known that twenty-six lives had been lost in the tornado early today and did much damage in this vicinity and that forty-four persons had bee injured. Of the injured thirty-five were seriously hurt and some of them may die. During the day Carl Warnquist and Mrs. J. A. Carlson died of their injuries. Several of the others are suffering from brok-

en limbs and internal injuries. In several cases entire families have been killed. A man named Switzer, a night watchman at the railway vards. lost his three children. N. P. Nelson with his wife and three children were found dead. Two other children were not at home and escaped intury. Tonight order had been practically brought out of chostic conditions that prevailed today and a relief committee had begun dispensing aid.
