BRAKEMAN KNEW NOTHING OF RAILROADING CAPTAIN M'LEAN HAS PASSED AWAY Battle Creek, Aug. 29. — That he knows practically nothing about the first principles railroading, had never passed any kind of an examination and had been refused employment, as conductor because he did not think he knew how to run a train, was the startling admission made by G. M. Graham, a brakeman on the ill-fated Grand Trunk passenger train No. 4, to State Railroad Commissioner Sunday, here Saturday night. Graham testified at the private inquiry in the afternoon, held before G. T. officials here and he declared his evidence given then was the same as given to Commissioner Sweeney. "I have only worked for G. T. since the 25th of last month," said Graham, "and never did any railroad work before I came here to accept the position as strike breaker."
