

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JOE PAGE TAKES OVER THE ST. JOHN BASEBALL TEAM

Montreal Sporting Men Interested in the Venture --Team will be Strengthened to Become Important Factor in the N. B. and Maine League Race.



The management of the St. John's baseball team have transferred their interest in the team to Joseph Page, president of the Montreal professional league and he will take charge of the maroons on Monday. While Mr. Page will have full charge of the team the men who will be interested with him in the venture are several well known Montreal sporting men who are interested in professional baseball in the Canadian metropolis, and who believe there is material in the St. John's for a winning aggregation providing that the team is properly strengthened.

Mr. Page has long experience in the baseball game and there is no better judge of a player in the game today. He has already started out to improve the team and has secured the services of Joseph Mulvey, a fast third baseman who also has a record as a hitter, to play that position. Mulvey was with the Columbia college team in New York and is a big league possibility. He is now in the city and turned out to practise with the St. John's last evening when he made a good impression. Two other fast men who will join the team next week are A. Brunet and D. Sabourin outfielders, who visited St. John with the Canadians of Montreal, earlier in the season. They are among the best players in Montreal and will no doubt, be a great strength to the local team. Dr. Hite, the new pitcher who was to have been on hand on Thursday afternoon was prevented from leaving Montreal on Wednesday night, but left last night, and is expected in the city at noon today. He will also get into the game with the St. John's next week and from his record this season with the Sherbrooke team and last year with his college team, he is expected to show much class.

CALAIS AND MARATHONS TO CLASH THIS AFTERNOON

One of the best games of the season will be that on the Marathon grounds this afternoon between the Calais team and the strengthened Marathons. The work of the Greeks in the games in Woodstock and on Coronation Day in this city, has been the chief topic of conversation with the fans. There is no question but that the arrival of such players as Winter, Williams and Tarbell has made a vast difference in the prospects of the team, but whether they can win from the Calais players with such men as Happy Iott, Joe Neptune and Ryan in the line-up of the border team, is a puzzle the solution of which should furnish great sport this afternoon. The Marathons' management are of the opinion that the team as now constituted, is strong enough to win the league and certainly it is the strongest and classiest aggregation of ball players which has represented this city for some time. The line-up for this afternoon's game will be the best and fastest the club is capable of. Winter, the ex-Boston American twirler, who was on the roster of the Boston club the year won the championship of the world will be in the box for the Marathons and he will be opposed by either Ryan or Kyrle. Tarbell, the Indian college player, who did such good work in the box on Coronation Day and who also won his game from the Woodstock team will be in the outfield ready to relieve Winter if such a course is deemed necessary. The opinion is however, that the big leaguer will be quite able to take the measure of the Calais swainsmen. The game will start at 3 o'clock sharp so as to give suburbanites an opportunity to see it in time to catch the afternoon trains to their country homes. The Marathons will line up as follows, the players being given in the order in which they will bat: Fraser, 2nd base; Winter, pitcher; Williams, 3rd base; Donnelly, left base; Riley, short stop; Dr. Malcolm, left field; Lynch, centre field; Tarbell, right field; Rootes or Nelson, catchers.

At their departure, it was announced that the team had been completed by the selection of the entrants in the hammer throw. For this event it was decided to take Damon Howard of Wiltman, Mass., a freshman, and Theodore C. Cable of Indianapolis, as the Harvard men, and C. C. Childs of Fremont, Ohio, captain of next year's Yale track team.
