FIRST DECORATION FOR GALLANTRY.
Paris, Aug. 13, 5.45 p. m.—The first officer to be decorated for gallantry in the war is Second Lieut. H. J. Bruyant, of the Fifteenth Dragons. General Joffre, the French commander-in-chief, in conferring the Cross of the Legion of Honor on Lieut. Bruyant, said the officer with seven of his men had charged thirty Uhlans and that Bruyant had killed the officer of the Uhlans with his own hands, while the other members of the band were routed.

FLOOD HOLLAND AS PRECAUTION.
Rotterdam, Aug. 13, via London, 6.30 p. m.—Sixty thousand Dutch troops are on the line of the frontier. Large areas of land have been flooded to a depth of three feet as a precautionary measure.

BROKEN IN SPIRIT, DON'T KNOW WHY WAR DECLARED.
Paris, Aug. 12, 2.10 p. m.—An official communication issued tonight says: "German prisoners who have been questioned give the impression that they are broken in spirit and physically weak from hunger. They seem not to have been informed concerning the reason for the mobilization, and one man asked why war had been declared."
