### BRITISH GOVERNMENT FIRST COLLATERAL

New American Loan to Features Making it Attractive of any Loan.

Special to The Standard. New York, Aug. 15.—Official announcement of the completion of arrangements for another American loan to Great Britain is expected in days. The new obligation, it is expected in banking circles, is to direct issue by the British Exchequer and not an obligation of the American Foreign Securities Company or similar corporation. It will be secured by collateral composed of Canadian and American securities and bonds of neutral nations. It will be the collateral loan ever issued by the British government. It will have a term, it is added, which will be the most attractive of any foreign ever offered here.

According to present arrangements the government of Great Britain will offer \$250,000,000 of two-year loan notes, secured by collateral of the market value of about \$300,000,000. The price to the public will be 95 cents. The British government was out of obtaining a much larger but American bankers advised \$250,000,000 was about all that could be absorbed readily by the American public at this time. Attention is directed to the fact that within a short time Russia will be in the market again for additional funds, about \$100,000,000.
