48.6 MILES AN HOUR  
IN A HYDROPLANE

Detroit, Sept. 5.—In one of the greatest performances ever seen in a hydroplane race Miss Minneapolis, of the Minneapolis Power Boat Association, this afternoon won the 90-mile gold cup race and incidentally established a new world's record of 55.3 miles an hour for five miles. She took the cup by finishing second to Miss Detroit in the final 30 mile heat today, which gave her 30 points against 18 for the local boat. The new record was made in the final lap. For the entire 90 miles her time was 2.07.48, or at the rate of 48.6 miles an hour.
