

EUDIST FATHERS SUSTAIN ANOTHER HEAVY LOSS

Sacred Heart College, at West Bathurst, Burned in Midst of Blizzard—Students Escaped in Safety—Missionary Men Lost Seminary at Caraquet.

Bathurst, March 6.—While one of the wildest blizzards of many years was raging early this morning fire broke out in the Sacred Heart College at West Bathurst and when the flames had done their work nothing remained of the magnificent building but three stone walls rising stark above a heap of smoking ashes. The fire was first seen just before three o'clock and in a few minutes such headway that the utmost efforts of the Eudist fathers were required to remove the 150 sleeping students in safety and as the fire was practically no fire-fighting apparatus within a mile it was immediately apparent that the edifice was doomed.

Students Saved. All the students were marched out in good order after being awakened and dressed and while most of them lost the greater part of their clothing and other belongings it is considered fortunate that none of the boys were injured or missed in the excitement.

Fanned by the violent gale the flames were not long in taking complete possession of the large building and by daylight everything had been destroyed except the stone walls on the east and north and south sides. The wooden residence of the provincial of the Eudist Order, which is situated just west of the college building, was not damaged as the fierce wind kept the heat from it to a certain extent and the same was true of the wooden recreation hall and

rink on the southwesterly side, although the latter was several times threatened when the flames scorched it during lulls in the storm. The destroyed building was erected about four years ago and was originally intended as a seminary for the training of young priests of the Eudist Order. It was 185 feet long, 80 feet wide and comprised four storeys besides a completely finished basement. The location of this immense building on the top of the hill overlooking the town of Bathurst made it the most conspicuous sight in this vicinity and its loss is a serious blow not only to the Eudist Order but also to Bathurst whose citizens were very proud of its possession.

After the destruction of the college owned by the Eudist Order at Caraquet a year ago the seminary building was converted into temporary quarters for the students and their professors and it is only last September that the classes were resumed in the new building.

The cause of the fire is unknown. Insurance amounting to \$55,000 was carried and the cost of the structure was not less than \$175,000 so that the Eudists are put to very heavy loss financially as well as seriously handicapped in their educational work. The students of the college are quartered today in various homes about town and as railway connections are at present badly disarranged it is likely that there will be much inconvenience in sending them to their homes.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of the homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning a homestead; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Homesteads may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Instantly six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house upon the land.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or rocky land. Live stock may be utilized for cultivation under certain conditions.
