

CAMPAIGN FOR MORE RECRUITS AS SOON AS MOBILIZATION ORDERED

New Brunswick's Second Regiment Expected to Be Completed Very Soon After Announcement of Place of Training—St. John Can Offer Whole Exhibition Building if Necessary—Will Railway Construction Corps Use Colonist Cars?—The Mounted Rifles.

Thursday, March 11. Military and other men are paying a deal of attention to the question where the 5th battalion will be mobilized. It is, of course, an all New Brunswick unit, though Prince Edward Islanders will be included, and the assumption is that it will have its headquarters in St. John or Fredericton. The only difficulty in the former case is the fact that the 29th battalion is still at the army, and there is no other suitable place for a big body of men left as the immigration buildings on the West Side are occupied by the Army Service Corps. The exhibition buildings have been mentioned and it is expected that the quarters now held there by the mounted rifles will soon be vacant, and the suggestion has been made that piping be installed in the main building of the 29th Field Artillery to mobilize at Fredericton. It is not thought that the battalion also will go there.

While a plan of campaign to help the recruiting for the battalion is being considered by some of the officers interested it is likely that it will be held up until news of the place of mobilization is received. A few more recruits were added to the list yesterday at the armory, where Lieutenant-Colonel Armstrong and Captain Miller are in daily attendance. Arrangements for the mobilization of the Railway Construction Corps at West St. John brought D. A. O'Mara, of the C. E. R., to the city yesterday. He was not prepared to make any definite statement as it is understood that much more preliminary work remains to be done before the corps can be assembled. About 500 men have been asked for and it is understood that about 400 have already sent in their names as volunteers.
