HUNGARIAN OF PEACE

Claim Peace

CALLS THIS WILSON'S POINT

BUDAPEST, Jan. 11. (By J. Taylor).—"No peace which is partially socialist will safeguard the world from future wars. Peace must be based on the principle of self-interest. Wilson has this in mind. I believe his fifteenth point, 'unimpaired and which must be based on the principle of self-interest,' these words, Michael Karolyi, Hungarian premier, described the United Press to-day what he should be accomplished at the congress.

The Hungarian premier emphasized the fact that he is not socialist himself and that he intends to use his fight against Bolshevism but he declared that he is absolutely convinced that peace must be based on social and economic as well as political.

He strongly advocated the principle of self-interest, and said that the world must stick to Wilson's fifteenth point, 'there will be another within a few years.'

Karolyi, a man of noble birth and an outstanding figure in Hungarian affairs. Formerly a member of the Hungarian independence and regarded as the one man who would the millions of his people solid entity.

"Hungary was dragged into the war by Austria and Germany," declared the premier. "Our policy never made in Vienna or Berlin. We were never walking on our own feet. I was against an armistice which meant that Berlin owned I couldn't do otherwise than test. I tried by every means to peace. I stood against the armistice. I openly protested against the Tilsit and Bucharest treaties, that we have lost the war, above all our hope is that President Wilson's principles will win at the conference. The Entente cannot Hungary be crushed.

"There must be a society of nations, with a 'fifteenth point,' peace which is not partially socialist will safeguard the world from future wars. President Wilson has this in mind. It constitutes his 'fifteenth point,' as yet unratified, which is developed before a treaty is signed. I am not socialist myself, but I intend to continue my fight against Bolshevism, but peace must be based on social and economic as well as political and it must be established on everything accomplished by the will to last.

"I am sure the nations will enough foresight to stick to President Wilson's fourteenth point, within a few years we will another world war. Hungary's policy in everything will be 'Wilson, Wilson, Wilson.'

"When I came into the government, I ordered the people to down their arms. I did so with the purpose of putting an end to the war. I hoped to show absolute confidence in the Wilsonian peace and relied upon their basic justice. Now Czech-Slovaks, Rumanians, Serbians are overwhelming us, so all parts of Hungary.

In the armistice, it was stated that the administration of occupied territory would stay in the hands of the Hungarians. This was demonstrated that so far Czech-Slovaks, Rumanians and Serbians were concerned, the armistice was military and not political. They were not meant to be kept. Wheat, other food supplies, coal are in the hands of the nations surrounding us. Distribution of necessities is impossible, economic and political state is less and unbearable.

"The people say that President Wilson cannot prevail at the conference. This agitation is dangerous—Buda is on the verge of the great catastrophe of Bolshevism. No, let us call it by
