Prohibitory Order Welcomed

The news from London, Eng., that  
the British Government has issued an  
order prohibiting any further export  
of silver bullion, is regarded by Cana-  
dian Border City bankers as the initial  
step in putting an end to the stream  
of Canadian silver that has been pour-  
ing into the United States during the  
past year.

The Canadian border points have all  
experienced an acute shortage of silver  
for months and banks have had utmost  
difficulty in supplying legitimate de-  
mands of their customers.

As an illustration of one of principal  
causes for the shortage in silver in  
this vicinity at least, a banker stated  
that one Windsor man alone in a  
single week had made \$175 by ex-  
changing Canadian silver obtained here  
for American bills in Detroit.

Then he returned to Windsor with  
his American currency, which he had  
no difficulty in selling to Windsor banks  
at a premium ranging from \$3.50 to  
\$4 per \$100.
