In the appeal of the St. Catharines Milling and Lumbering Company from the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada, confirming the right of the Outario Government to deal with the lumber in the lately disputed territory, the solicitors for the Dominion Government have given notice of the intention of the Government to intervene and become a party to the suit. The suit has hitherto been conducted solely in the name of the St. Catherines Milling and Lumbering Company. The Dominion Government have been constantly urged by the Ontario Government to take this step in order finally to decide the question, but have hitherto refused. The case opens of the 10th July.

Some of the Tory papers are trying to make capital against the Mowat Government in connection with the regulations and fees for admission to the Niagara Falls Park. The Teronto World puts the matter in its true light in the following paragraph : - " The Park and Falls are free; visitors who wish to drive over to certain islands and who wish to go by elevator below the Falls in rubber suits are charged 10 cents in the first case and 50 cents in the other. We think this is right. We do not see that the people of Ontario should be taxed to provide rubber suits and elevators for tourists (many of them from outside Ontario) who have plenty of money to pay the reasonable charge that is made. GUELPH JUNCTION VS GRAND TRUNK. Lively Session Before

Railway Committee.

The difficulty between the Guelph Junction and the Grand Trunk in regard to crossing the Grand Trunk lot at Inglis' bridge to reach Goldie's mills had another hearing before the Railway Committee of the Privy Council at Ostawa on Saturday. Our readers know that the contract between the city and the Canadian Pacific requires that the Guelph Junction should reach Goldie's mills. 'The Grand Trunk made no open show or resistance until the building of the road was under way, but when it came to expropriation of the G. T. R. land required to reach the mill the Grand Trunk showed their hand and started in for a bitter fight. The Guelph Janction directors have sought in vain to come to some compromise in the matter

Grand Trunk engineers and solicitors treated their advances with contempt. The meeting on Saturday was held in the office of the Minister of Railways. Mr. Pope, however, was not present, the Railway Committee of the Privy Council being made up of Sir Hector Langevin, who presided, Mr. Carling and Mr. Thompson. The first business taken up was the consideration of the G. J. R. application. - Mr. S. H. Blake, Q.C., and Mr. Pops, Belleville, from the office of Mr. John Bell, G.T.R. Solicitor, represented the Grand Trunk, and were assisted by Mr. Joseph Hobson, G.T.R. evgineer, Mr. Walter Shanley, M.P., and Mr. Kennedy, engineer of the Montreal Harbor Commissioners, Hon, R. W. Scott, Q.C., and Mr. Jeonings, engineer, appeared for the Canadian Pacific, and the Oity and Guelph Junction were represented by Mayor Macdonald, President Bell,

Davis, Assessor Chadwick, Alds. Gowdy Davis, Assessor Chadwick, Alds. Gowdy and Klæpfer and Mr. Jss. Goldie.

The Guelph Junction at first made application to reach the milt by asking for running powers over the Grand Trank switch, but at the suggestion of Mr. Goldie, who promised to extend his mill to accommodate an independent switch, a line was sketched which would reach the end of his mill without using or crossing the Grand Trank switch. This was accepted by the Gueiph Junction, but the G. T. R., without being able to offer any sound reason therefor, etill objected, Mr. Blake contending that the line should be kept as far away from the Grand Trank as possible, and auggesting a switch down by the river. Mr. Scott put forward a double-barreited argument why this should not be done. In the first place he represented that the line laid down on the plans presented was the alignment adopted for the main line of the Guelph Junction railway, and it would not be just to cause a deviction of the line just to please their opponents. Then there were engineering difficulties in following the path so kmelly chosen by Mr. Blake. Mr. Goldie protested regainst the line which Mr. Blake in his extremity finally suggested, because it would interfere with the road to the rear of his mill, thus injuring his tarmers' trade, besides causing great additional expense.

A docurrent was produced and read by Mr. Blake with reference to Mr. Goldie's arrangement with the Great West-rn in regard to the Spur line, for the purpose of showing that they were entisted to the sole use of the switch on Mr. Goldie's land, but when the document came to be carefully examined, it was found that it showed nothing of the kind. After a deat of chaffering the chairman stated that the Committee would take the matter into considera'ion and would probably in the meantime have the locality examined by a Government engineer.

The Grand Trunk tried to make out The Grand Trunk tried to make out that it was enjust to them to have the fraffin taken away from them, after building a spur line for Mr. Goldie's benefit. But it was shown that the Great Western had originally built the Spur line to Goldie's mills for the very purpose of compating with the Grand Trunk for its traffir. It seems now they wish to prevent the Gueiph Junction doing the very thing the Great Western originally did.

The New Temple at Grimsby Park.

The opening of the new temple at Grimsby Park was attended on Monday by nearly 5,000 people from various parts of the adjoining country. The new temple, which will seat about four thousand people, consists of an immense dome or canopy ninety-five feet high and 350 feet wide. About 200,000 feet of lumber and five tons of nails were used in its construction. The building is 103 feet high over all, and 480 feet wide from verandah to verandah. It is covered with 2,500 yards of canvas and rests on a stone foundation. The total cost reached nearly \$9,000. The Beamsville band furnished the music on Monday. Rev. Dr. Griffin, in the course of a stirring address, characterized the building as a wonderful, original, magnificent, and astounding structure. He regretted Sir John Macdonald's absence, but was ready to extend a hearty welcome to him, because he had heard the right hon. gentleman had joined the Methodist Church, and the discipline required him to have all charity towards his brethren. (Laughter.) He had a standing offer of a gold medal for the man who could tell the difference between a Grit and a Tory. (Laughter.) He was proud of Canada, and declared that this country would never be annexed to the United States. (Applause.)
