

To accomplish these objects, the co-operation of the benevolent is earnestly solicited:—

1st. By furnishing means of clothing and supporting the poor by cast-off dresses, old shoes, &c., remnants of cloth, and such like; and by donations of provisions and money.

2nd. By furnishing employment for the poor—and finding places for servants and apprentices.—common needle work—knitting, and other kinds of work, may be done by the inmates of the house. The Committee will guarantee the safety of whatever work may be sent to the Superintendent for the poor.

3rd. By visiting the House of Industry and personally inspecting the cases relieved, and by countenancing and encouraging the inmates in the discharge of their duties.
