There she was, sitting the desk, completely oblivious of a crossfire of admiring male glances.

Notes to the Statement of Continuity of Reserve Funds:

Note 1: The general municipal development funds have been accumulated for various purposes.

Note 2: These funds have been allocated specifically for the acquisition of park lands.

Note 3: U.S. exchange fund has been established to provide funds for the cost of foreign exchange on the retirement of long-term debentures in U.S. dollars. Note 4: The proceeds from the Ontario Water Resources Commission Agreement have been placed in reserve to maintain water and sewer charges at a reasonable and consistent level.

Note 5: These funds have been accumulated for the purpose of providing funds for the replacement of vehicles and motorized equipment currently in service. Note 6: The proceeds from the Social Amenities Agreements with the three large developers in the Town are being held in reserve until needed facilities can be decided upon and contracted
