It is often assumed that folk-tradition has disappeared in Canada. This view is not correct, for we have clear evidence that the collection of traditional folk-songs, ballads, folk-tales, popular rhymes and sayings, proverbs, beliefs, games, and folk-remedies, may still yield a bountiful harvest. This work must be undertaken without delay, however, for traditional knowledge of these matters is vanishing rapidly.

The American Folk-Lore Society has recently extended its activities to Canada, and is trying to help Canadian folk-lorists in the systematic collection and publication of such first-hand data as pertain to oral tradition.
