North of Sparrow Lake the land becomes more rugged, and by degrees we find ourselves in the real Muskoka country, with its rocks and trees, its hills and hollows, its many takes and s' reams, each disclosing fresh beauties as our train winds its way in and out and roundabout. Finally we cross Coulter's Narrows, tra-verse Wanilah Island, 'over a swing bridge and come to a pause at Bala Park, the next stop on the famous Muskoka Lakes. Here steamers are in waiting to carry tourists to such destinations as they may have in mind on Lake M: "koka.
