

### CONFERENCES AT MONTREAL Mulock and Prefontaine Meeting the Strikers.

Montreal, May 8 .- Sir William Mulock, Minister of Labor, and Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, arrived here from Ottawa yesterday to act as intermediaries between the shippers and striking 'longshoremen. Mr. J. G. O'Neil, leader of the strikers, had al ready been to the capital, so the representatives of the Government were informed as to the stand taken by the men. They first received a deputation representing the city's interest, composed of the Mayor and the Presidents of the Board of Trade, Chamber of Commerce and Harbor Commissioners. The deputation asked to have regular troops sent to Montreal, but Sir William explained that the course to pursue, as indicated by the law, was for the district officer in command to draw from time to time from the various regiments in his military district. The matter was really one to be dealt with by she municipal authorities, from which the D.O.C. should receive his orders.


#### MAY BRING ON A WAR. Bulgaria Defiantly Returns the Note From the Porte.

Constantinople, May 8.-The Bulgarian Government has returned the Porte's note on the subject of the incursion of Bulgarian bands into Macedonia and the importation of explos ives into Turkey from Bulgaria to the Ottoman Commissioner at Sofia, in consequence of what the Governmen of Bulgaria describes as "its offensive terms."

The British Foreign Office also understands that neither Russia nor Austria intends to interfere, unless some unseen issue becomes involved. Thus, Turkey appears to have a dear hand. The British Foreign Office is inclined to the belief that Turkey will not go so far as to commence hostilities against Bulgaria, but will content herself with threats, and, perhaps, by other means than force, secure reparation for her alleged wrongs.




