MONTREAL STOCKS.

The past week has seen a little more activity in trading and more life was exhibited in stocks. Barring the passing of the dividend of Nova Scotia Steel, which had been discounted, nothing of an exciting nature has occurred. This morning trading turned over about fifteen hundred shares, whilst the afternoon turnover covered about five hundred and fifty shares, pretty well distributed over the list. There was some demand for Richelieu and Rio. Bank of Montreal advanced on a sale of 50 shares. Montreal Street was weaker at 179 3/4, but recovered to 180 at the close of the session. Canadian Pacific was strong at 160 3/8. Iron preferred sold at 44 bid, 44 1/2 asked. Richelieu sold at 75 1/2 and at noon 75 1/2 was bid with 76 1/2 asked. This company is doing very well. Rio was active at a fractional advance to 45 1/4. Power and Coal were quite neglected. Following is the general list.

BUTTER.

Exports last week 1874 packages. Market is strong in tone, and local dealers are asking 22 5/8c for round lots and 23c for grocers. Farham obtained 22c at to-day's sales.

Shipments last week from Montreal 52,881 boxes, from Quebec, 9907 boxes, in all 56,788 boxes. Market is quiet but firm in sympathy with the high prices in the country. Western, 11 5/8c to 11 3/4c Eastern, 11 1/4c on spot. Boat cheese sold at 11c this morning.

COUNTRY PRODUCE

Eggs.—In face of large receipts a decline in prices was anticipated, but it did not materialize. The increased consumption takes up all offerings. We quote: Selected, 18c. No. 1 at 16 1/2c to 17c and No. 2 at 14c per doz.

A firm feeling prevails in beans, the volume of business passing is not large and sales of Austrian stock in a jobbing way were made at \$2.05 to \$2.10 and Ontario at \$2.15 to \$2.25 per bushel.

The demand for potatoes in a jobbing way is fair, but car lots are quiet owing to increased offerings. Green Mountains are quoted on tracks at 90c to 95c; Quebec white at 80c to 85c; with red stock quoted at 80c per bag in car lots. In a jobbing way Green Mountains sold at \$1.05; Quebec white at \$1.10 to \$1.15 and red stock at \$1.15 to \$1.20.

PROVISION MARKET.

Fresh hogs are steady at \$9 to \$9.25 per 100 lbs. Live hogs, selected lots, fetched \$6.60 weighed off scales. We quote: Pork—Heavy Canada short cut mess pork, in tierces, \$32 to \$32.50; heavy Canada short cut mess pork, in barrels, \$21.50 to \$22; selected heavy Canada short cut mess pork, boneless, \$22 to \$22.50. Canada short cut clean pork, \$21 to \$21.50; very heavy clear fat back pork, \$22 to \$22.50.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK MARKET.

Receipts for the week ending June 13 are 2625 cattle, 2753 sheep and lambs, 2516 hogs and 1027 calves. The supply for local consumption yesterday consisted of 800 cattle, 350 sheep and lambs, 1200 hogs and 125 calves. Prices for choice beef cattle are stiff as the visible supply is narrowing down to a dangerous point. Choice beefs sold at 6 1/2c to 6 3/4c; good, 5 3/4c to 6 1/2c; fair, 5 1/4c to 5 1/2c; common at 4 1/2c to 5c; inferior at 3 1/2c to 4 1/4c; and common 2 1/4c to 2 3/4c per lb. and common 2 1/4c to 2 3/4c per lb.

Flour, Grain, and Hay Markets.

The local and outside demand for Manitoba feed wheat showed no improvement, but prices rule about steady at 71c for No. 1 and at 68 1/2c for No. 2 per bushel. Exporters in oats business continue quiet owing to the fact that both local and outside buyers have ample
