Associated Charities Is Now Permanent Feature

Organization Was Effected at a Big Meeting Held on Monday—By-Laws Are Drawn Up and Workers are Hopeful.

A meeting of the general committee of the Associated Charities of Brantford was held yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the City Council chamber in the city hall. Rev. G. A. Woodside presided and Rev. C. W. Rose was elected secretary pro tem. Those present were: Rev. A. E. Lavell, Mr. O'Neil, Geo. Wedlake, Frank Cockshutt, Mrs. Livingston, Relief Officer Eddy, J. L. Axford.

The first business transacted was the consideration of the report of the committee appointed to draw up a constitution which was read by the convenor, Rev. A. E. Lavell. This was gone over clause by clause and finally adopted as read. The constitution is as follows:

The name of the organization shall be, "The Associated Charities of Brantford."

1—It shall serve as a centre for bringing into harmony the work of all agencies administering charity in the city of Brantford, thus preventing overlapping, indiscriminate giving, fraud, needless waste and growth of pauperism.

2—It shall serve as an agent for the organization and administration of material relief given the Associated Charities for such purpose.

3—It shall from time to time inaugurate such other forms of service in the administration of charity and in the education of the public as to the problems of charity as it may deem necessary.

4—It shall secure prompt, thorough and sympathetic investigation of all applications or cases calling for relief, and keep records of the same, and furnish the information thus obtained as it may be required, such as have legitimate interest therein.

5—No institution or other charitable society represented in this Associated Charities shall be liable to be interfered with in respect to its own unity, independence, or method of work.

Membership of the Associated Charities shall consist of the following:

1—Patrons elected by the Board of management.

2—All members of institution or organizations doing charitable work that have joined this federation by their own vote, with the approval of the executive committee of this Associated Charities.

3—Such persons as may be elected by this Associated Charities.

Note: The membership fee of the Associated Charities, in all cases, shall be one dollar per year, payable in advance.

4—The mayor and the police magistrate shall be ex-officio members.

A committee to nominate officers was appointed as follows: Rev. G. A. Woodside, convenor, T. H. Preston, Rev. A. E. Lavell and Mrs. Livingston.

Work Already Done.

Mr. Cockshutt, as chairman of the temporary committee appointed to dispense relief, then gave a short account of the work thus far accomplished. A good many had applied for help and there were those who belong to the class that apply for help on every occasion, and to every society, and on the other hand there were many who deserved help. Many were self-respecting and refused aid altogether. One man went to him and asked for some coal as he seemed a worthy man. Mr. Cockshutt made out an order for half a ton of coal, but the man refused to take it, saying he would only take a quarter ton and would pay for it later. The aim should be to help the people to help themselves, to encourage thrift wherever possible and to keep as far as possible from pauperizing anyone.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again at the call of the chairman.
