HEARING CASES BEFORE KADI IN COURT TODAY
Fifteen Gallons of Beer Consumed in Three Days—A Theft Charge.
The question of how a man and his wife could consume 15 gallons of beer in three days and keep within the limits of the law was put before Magistrate Livingston this morning, when John Galka was charged with a breach of the Liquor License Act. It was proved that defendant who lives at 58 Wadsworth street, had ordered and received two small kegs of beer on Saturday, April 11th, and on Monday when the house was searched, that all the kegs were empty. He said that a mistake had been made, as he lived in a double house, and that some of the beer might have been ordered by his neighbor. He also said that he let some of his rooms to boarders who might have ordered the liquor. The magistrate decided that the beer was only got for one purpose, and that was for sale. The man and his wife could not have imbibed the whole of the spirit in the time mentioned, and he therefore imposed a fine of \$100. Tony Kurtz was fined \$100 for a similar offence. Yesterday he stated that he had only purchased one cask of beer during four months, and that was for his wife. This morning, the driver of Mr Coulson testified that he had delivered several kegs lately, the usual custom in the case being to supply a couple of kegs on Saturday, one of which was emptied and refilled on Monday. The defendant usually ordered two kegs at a time. The magistrate was satisfied that the statement of defendant was not true, and he inflicted a fine of \$100. This was the second fine of that amount during the sitting.

A Football Game
A group of four young fellows, feeling hilarious at the Grand Trunk station yesterday, noted a quiet looking Armenian, and when his hat blew off they proceeded to have a game of football with it to the distraction of the owner. The game continued until P. C. Borewick came upon the scene when the players hastily decamped, and the hat returned to its owner, who with tears in his eyes thanked the officer. As a sequel to the affair, Joe Atfield, one of the four, came before Magistrate Livingston this morning and was fined \$3 for his part of the game. As a usually happens, he claimed that the police had got hold of the only innocent member of the four. A curious fact was that in spite of the officer's statement that the hat, which was a "Christie", was badly dented and battered in the game, the Armenian declared his hat was alright and he did not want any money to get another.

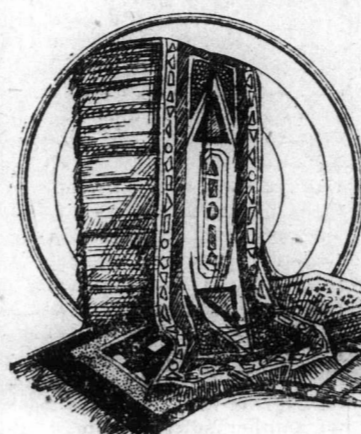
A Theft Charge.
Thomas Palmer was brought back from Montreal by Sergeant Wallace, and was charged with theft at the court this morning. The articles stolen consisted of a gun, chronometer and an engineering instrument, altogether valued at about \$125. He pleaded guilty, under provocative circumstances.
According to defendant's story, the L. E. and N. Railway company, owed him some money and he took the articles to balance his account with them. He had been a resident engineer at Waterford and whilst there had bought an automobile. This had reduced his livery expenses, but the expenditure was not allowed to him. He claimed the expenses incurred in running the auto, and in lieu of them he took the instruments. The instruments had been returned and he (defendant) did not see why the charge had been laid after this action. In view of this, the magistrate asked why undue haste had been made in effecting the arrest and Mr. Kellett informed him that he had been instructed by his company to issue a warrant. He did not want to press the charge, as all the stolen articles had been returned. His side of the story was that defendant had tampered with his expense bills, making the defalcations amount to over \$100. The young man, who was 24 years old, had been living in a style which his income did not warrant and he had told Palmer that his employers did not approve of his mode of living. Defendant had laughed this off.
Palmer expressed his penitence. He knew he had done wrong, he said, and had only thought that he was

LOCAL FIREMEN ANSWER TWO CALLS
Grand Valley Car Had a Hot Box—False Alarm Turned in From George Street
The central fire department are having a busy session the last week. Again, yesterday, two calls were turned into the hall for minor blazes.

Last night at 10:55, a telephone call was turned in from Market and Colborne street that one of the Grand Valley cars was on fire at that corner. Captain Kingswell and fireman Curtis responded to the call with two chemical tanks and found of the car in a blaze. In a short time they had the fire out with little damage being done. A hot box was the cause. At 11:02, while there men were working at the car, another telephone call came from Benwell's Hotel, that Stedman Bros. factory on George street, was on fire. The firemen made an exceptionally quick run but found on their arrival that the night watchman had been burning some old cloth and paper, etc., and sparks were flying out of the chimney. The firemen investigated the place thoroughly, but found everything all right and in no danger of damage being done.
