GUN TO WARN TRAINS.

Self-Loading Device Ousts Fogs from Jobs.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—Railway fog-men have been rendered obsolete by a new and remarkable system of fog-signalling which has been installed on the District Line. The new apparatus, which is worked in connection with the automatic signal works, has an arm which works simultaneously with the ordinary signal. When the signal is at danger and a train enters the section the arm picks out a detonator from the magazine fixed to the machine and places it on the line. Directly the signal is lowered and the train proceeds, the arm swings back, drops the used detonator and picks up another.

DUBLIN, Ind., Oct. 21.—"Are you dead yet?" was the inquiry written on a postcard addressed to John W. Mart at Marion. The card arrived just one hour after the death of Mart. It was sent by Carl McPherson of South Bend, an old friend. The two had not met for some time. Mart was a conductor employed by the Indiana Union Traction Company.

**PREFERS LION TO WIFE.**

Henpecked Trainer Seeks Refuge in Animal Den.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 21.—Rather than face his angry spouse when he came back to their tent at the State fair intoxicated, James Swenson, a lion tamer, crawled into the cage with one of his lions, slept all night, his head pillowed on the brute. In the morning Mrs. Swenson instigated a search for her recreant spouse with a tent stake. With a job of the stake she awakened the animal tamer. "Coward," she hissed at him, as he snuggled up to the lion out of reach of the stick.

**WEDDING, THEN FUNERAL.**

Preacher Ties Pair While on Way to Cemetery.

ATHENS, Ga., Oct. 21.—On the way to the cemetery from the church where he had just officiated at funeral obsequies, the Rev. E. W. Mercer left the procession for the purpose of marrying a couple who were in a hurry. The happy couple was W. W. Davis, aged eighty, of Nicholson, and Mrs. Luella Kidwell, aged forty, of Athens. It was the fourth plunge into matrimonial seas for the bridegroom and the second for the bride. The preacher left the funeral cortege when he reached the post-office, went in, married the couple in three minutes, and then getting back into his carriage, followed the funeral procession at a rapid pace, catching up with it just before it reached the cemetery.

**INCOME \$10,000,000 SHORT.**

Germany's Revenue Will Compel Rigid Economy.

BERLIN, Oct. 21.—According to the Lokalanzeiger, as a result of Ministerial conferences it has been decided not to introduce new Imperial taxation before the elections next autumn, and for the present the government will trust to rigorous economy in all departments to make expenditure and revenue balance.

**FATHER SELLS BOY FOR \$25.**

Deal May Stand, as Purchaser Wants to Adopt Child.

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 21.—Joseph Kaninski, four years old, was sold recently by his father to August Schrimm, Kaninski's employer, for \$25. The sale may stand. Mrs. Schrimm displayed the bill of sale in court and asked to make a legal adoption. As Kaninski is often in jail, Mrs. Schrimm explained that she first took charge of the boy when the father was serving a jail sentence.

**GROWS RECORD GERANIUM.**

California Man Produces One Six Inches in Diameter.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 21.—Richard Diener, a gardener of Colma, has perfected a geranium that is six inches in diameter, which is pronounced by experts one of the most extraordinary achievements in floral culture. Diener also has produced geraniums four or five inches in diameter by crossing them with the "propensity" pink. He has secured fifty-seven varieties of dahlias, and is now trying to produce a blue dahlia.

**GIRL BEARS BODY HOME.**

Hunting Victim in Wheelbarrow, She Trudges Miles.

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich., Oct. 21.—When the twelve-year-old son of Adam Lockhart, a farmer, was accidentally shot and killed while hunting, Alice Nugent Front, a young girl, placed his body in a wheelbarrow and trudge several miles to the home of her parents.

PARIS, Oct. 21.—The problem to be decided is that of the proper width of skirts. The general belief is that they will be wider.

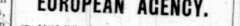
