SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.
ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may, on or before the 1st day of April, 1913, apply to the Department of the Interior for a grant of a quarter section of vacant Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside upon the homestead or pre-empt six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 30 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
