An Appeal Against the Trial Judge's Decision. COURT RESERVES JUDGMENT.

Toronto, Sept. 19 .- The hearing of Toronto, Sept. 19.—The hearing of the East Elgin election appeal commenced yesterday by the Court of Appeal. All the judges composing the court were present, with the exception of Mr. Justice. Osler, who, as one of the trial judges at the trial, could not sit at the hearing of the appeal. A petition was entered against the former's return, and on Nov. 28th last the trial came off before Hon. Justices Osler and MacMahon, and on several charges judgment was reserved, until Dec. 7th. It was then held by the trial judges that some of the bribery charges had been proved, but that agency had not been established. Accordingly, none of the charges succeeded as affecting the election, and the petition was dismissed. The appeal taken by the petitioner was as to charges which grouped themselves under two heads.
