class certificates 12, second class \$6, third class \$3, Model school only 45.

Continuation grants: Legislative grants \$1,747.50, County grants \$1,807.50, total \$3,555.00.

The total enrolment of pupils for 1906 was 4,624, daily average 2,757, percentage 1.867.

During the year 288 pupils wrote for the entrance examinations, and 281 passed; 120 wrote for the Public School Leaving, and 102 passed, at a total cost of \$109.42.

The total Legislative grants to rural school libraries amounted to \$117.00.

Chairman Denholm brought in the following report on the County Auditors' report:

That we have taken up, discussed and fully considered the Auditors' report, and recommend the adoption of the same as amended in committee, and also the following recommendations based on the report:

1. That the Treasurer's Office be furnished with a plan of all the subdivisions of the townships and villages, and copies of the same to the municipalities.

2. That the forms necessary for keeping arrears of taxes records between the Treasurer's office and the municipalities be procured by the county.

3. That the over-charges to the municipalities for keeping minutes in the House of Refuge be refunded.

4. That the item of \$204.21, in redemption of the lands account for the items prior to 1891 be struck out and the Treasurer be given authority to so strike it out.

Another clause of the report recommended the striking out of a number of the clauses of the Auditors' report.

The Council then adjourned to meet again at two o'clock. Captain Ribble distributed tickets among the members to attend the Non-Guns' moonlight on the City of Chatham in the evening.
