LOST DOG ANSWERS "AD."

Replied In Person to Enquiry For His Own Recovery.

Here is the latest dog story. It is the story of a lost dog which answer-ed in person an advertisement about himself before it had been published. It is vouched for by J. Parsons, pro-prietor of a staid provincial paper, the Hastings and St. Leonards Ob-server.

One day an advertisement containing a description of a lost dog and offering a reward of five shilling (\$1:25) for its recovery was handed into the office of the newspaper. It was set up in type, with hundreds of others, and in due course passed into the hands of the "maker up" for classification. While he was perusing it a strange dog made its appearance in the composing room. To get there it had made its way up five flights of stairs.

The coincidence, of course, impressed the "maker up" as something de-The coincidence, of course, impressed the "maker up" as something decidedly out of the common. But his astonishment was vastly greater on discovering that the animal bore a striking resemblance to the description given of the lost dog in the advertisement which he held in his hand. He kept the dog in the composing room until the paper had gone to press, and an hour or two later, accompanied by it, presented himself at the address given. It was the dog that had been lost, sure enough, and the man was given the five shillings reward. Now the question has arisen whether the long arm of coincidence can be stretched far enough to account for the dog's behavior, or whether it was led to anticipate the appearance of the advertisement by some spook.

The Macri Tattocer.

The song of the Macri tattocer in days of old was prophetic, for his will soon be a vanished art. Already much has, according to The British Australasian, been lost regarding the value and significance of the chiselled spirals and arabesques for when the spirals and arabesques, for when the Maori of the old school disappeared beneath the tide of an advancing civilization the key to this knowledge was buried with him. Neither the white man nor the modern Maori can available the priviles on which the white man nor the modern Maori can explain the principles on which the moke or face-markings, of one chief used to differ from that of another, or can interpret the imagery expressed in the various spirals. The practice of tattooing is dying out so rapidly that the time seems near at hand when the history of this astonishing custom will have to be taken from the dried specimens. It is this that makes Major-Gen. Robley's collection of dried tattooed heads so interesting and valuable. This collection, patiently gathered together during a long series of years, contains no less than thirty specimens of tattooed heads, ranging in period from 1770 to 1831, and illustrating with remarkable completeness the style and skill of the ranging in period from 1770 to 1831, and illustrating with remarkable completeness the style and skill of the old-time Maori artists. These heads exceed in number those to be found in the museum of New Zealand, the British Museum, the Jardin des Plantes, the Royal Museums of Washington, Rome, Sydney, and others combined. The collection is thus unique, and, indeed, irreplaceable. It is carefully classified and arranged, and shows the wild art in its different conventional stages from the young warrior to the tukipu or fully-tattooed chief. Many visitors from New Zealand have been to see Major-Gen. Robley's collection in London, and have expressed the hope that it will find a resting-place in the country from which it originally came. This also is the desire of the owner of the collection, and though he has received offers from continental museums, he is willing to give the New Zealand Government an opportunity of acquiring the relics for preservation in one of the museums of the colony. New Zealand has suffered seriously from the depletion of its most notable relics during the past hundred years, and every effort should be made to repair the mischief whenever the opportunity occurs.

ILLEGAL DIVORCE.

British Columbia Has Raised Ques-tion of Provincial Powers.

British Columbia Has Raised Question of Provincial Powers.

Vancouver, July 29.—The Minister of Justice will be asked to take part in arguing the question raised here as to the powers of the provincial court in matters of divorce. The point is whether the E.N.A. Act, which includes marriage and divorce among the exclusive powers of the Dominion Parliament, did not sweep away the rights of the courts in this province and Nova Scotia, which alone of the provinces have divorce courts.

Both have exercised this power until now unquestioned, since pre-confederation days, and British Columbia since 1857, when the then colony adopted this law of England.

Justice Clement, formerly of Toronto, raised the question in a local case. A stated case is likely to go to the Privy Council. If the two provinces have not this power. Ottawa would have to pass an enabling act to validate all the illegal divorce decrees of both provinces.
