THE "YELLOW PERIL."

Baron Komura Writes of the Influence of the Simple Life Upon the Success of Japan.

The so called "yellow peril" is wholly the creation of the imagination on the part of some interested people of Europe, writes Baron Komura, the Mikado's chief peace plenipotentiary.

Not only Japan and China, but the entire civilized world, will gain immeasurably by our conflict with Russia. The Japanese feel most gratified because in the war they have not only obtained the permanent safety and lasting security of their own country, as it seems now, but have for at least a century and perhaps for all time arrested the "glacial advance" of the bear to the southeast.

The Japanese people could never have won the victory they have won were it not for three things. In the first place, they were thrice armed by having their quarrel just; secondly, their entire public service was absolutely free from corrupt practices, and, lastly, their mode of life has ever been one of such extreme simplicity that their soldiers thus gained an equipment for the stress of war they never could have gained had they, like too many other nations, abandoned themselves to lives of luxury and sloth and been unwilling, if not unable, to put their hands to strenuous tasks.

The importance of the simple life has in Japan been demonstrated by the whole body of the people just as it has been by a few individual instances in this country.

It will not require many years for Japan to recover fully from the effects of the war with Russia; she will gain also from the growth of commercial and political relations with the United States, England and Europe, and I am positive that in the future those who are prophesying about the "yellow peril" will not find their lightning predictions realized in the slightest degree.

Our treatment of prisoners of war has been so human that the Russians have not a word of complaint to make. Besides nursing their sick and giving the other prisoners the best of care, we provided entertainments for them, and as a result many a poor fellow leads a happier life in the enemy's country than he ever did in his own.

Mr. Hugh Watt, Ex-M.P. The war was started the other day by the recital of a terrible story from London. It related that a great sensation had been created by the arrest of Hugh Watt, a financier and formerly a member of Parliament for the Camachie division of Glasgow, on the charge of attempting to procure a private detective to assist in the murder of his former wife.

Detective Marshall testified in a London police court that Watt offered him \$25,000 if he would induce the woman to come to Watt's flat, where he proposed to kill her by the administration of chloroform and then to remove the smell of chloroform with Peppermint.

Watt was remanded for trial in bail of \$3,000. The police found both chloroform and peppermint in Watt's apartments. Watt was prominent in the divorce court some years ago when his wife

Dr. Hugh Watt, Ex-M.P. sued for a divorce, the co-respondent being Lady Violet Beauchamp, daughter of the late Lord and Lady Roden, and the divorced wife of Sir Reginald Beauchamp, whom Watt has since married.

Since the granting of the divorce Watt and his former wife have been in the law courts regarding their marriage settlements and much bitterness has resulted from this litigation. A couple of weeks ago the parties appeared in a police court, Watt charging the woman with having assaulted and violently ejected him from her house, where he said he went for the purpose of trying to compromise their business disagreements.
