Vacation Penicillings.

When one has decided to take a vacation another question, equally difficult to settle, is where to go. After much mental debating, New England was fixed upon as the scene of our rambles this season. The next problem with which to grapple is the route to take. When one of large experience says it is best to go by St John, another suggests the Halifax route as the most desirable, a third says Yarmouth offers more inducements than any other, and a fourth is willing to talk all day in favor of Annapolis surpassing all other routes in every respect, what wonder is it that an ordinary mortal becomes so mystified and confused that he feels like giving up the whole business and remaining at home forever. After a protracted season of indecision it was finally settled that our trip should be by Halifax and per the S. S. Halifax. Perhaps a brief description of this magnificent steamer may not be out of place just now. This large and commodious steamer was built in Glasgow, Scotland, under the superintendence of Capt. S. R. Hill, her present commander, and the one who first conceived the idea of such a boat being placed upon the route between Boston and Halifax. She is 260 feet long and of 1700 tons capacity. Her promenade deck, which is one of the most spacious to be found on any boat on our coast, is about 230 feet long. She is loaded, discharged, heated, steered and driven by steam. And the engines which furnish the motive power are 3000 horse power whose average rate of speed seldom falls below 15 knots. She is lighted throughout by incandescent electric lights, which make the parlors and state-rooms very pleasant in the evening and enable the passengers to pass the time in reading. The state-rooms are very comfortable and neatly kept. They are furnished with electric bells, which are always promptly answered by courteous waiters. The parlors are made so attractive as possible by a good supply of papers and magazines. A fine piano and organ are always at the disposal of the passengers. The traveller can always rely upon getting the wants of the inner man well supplied as the Halifax puts forth extra efforts to set a good table. Every delicacy the season provides can be found there. No boat could have a better staff of officers than are to be found on this one. All are unremitting in their endeavors to contribute to the pleasure and comfort of passengers. Capt Hill is a most genial and gentlemanly person, yet a thorough disciplinarian as the running of the boat clearly demonstrates. The Halifax moves through the water very gracefully and gently, there being no jar and very little roll, so that one's equilibrium is not likely to be disturbed. It is doubtful if there is a boat that plys between Nova Scotia and Boston which carries so few sea-sick passengers, as does this one, notwithstanding she seldom makes a trip with less than two hundred on board. She is also a very safe boat and is in charge of a most careful captain. This of itself makes her a very desirable one on which to take a passage. Her rate of speed is very good and steady. Her trips are so arranged that she leaves and enters port by daylight and is only one night at sea. This affords those who travel by her an opportunity of viewing two of the finest harbors in the world by daylight. Points of interest are gladly pointed out to the stranger by any of the crew. They seem delighted to do so and do not make the inquirer feel as though he had committed some great crime by asking for information. And the information given by them may be relied upon. Every thing considered the Halifax evidently offers the traveller the best, the safest, the most comfortable and the most direct passage between Nova Scotia and Boston. The Canada and Atlantic S. S. Co. deserves credit for putting such a famous steamer on the line. It must have required a considerable amount of study on their part to arrange everything so well as to meet the wants of the traveller so well and it must be quite encouraging to them to see their steamer increasing in popularity and patronage as she is doing.

Saint John Exhibition Notes.

The attention of the directors of the Exhibition Association having been called to the omission of Cleveland Bays from the list of horses for which prizes are offered, have notified the parties interested that the omission was entirely unintentional, and that the same amount of prizes will be awarded for that class as all others enumerated in the horse section.

The "Lodgings and Refreshment Committee" of the Association are making most complete arrangements for billeting visitors during the Exhibition. Cards have been sent out to most of the citizens, asking each one having a room vacant to place it at the disposal of the Committee during the Exhibition, in order that ample accommodation may be made for the large number of visitors that will be in the city. A reception room will be opened, where a sufficient staff of clerks will be kept constantly employed, night and day, during the Exhibition, and on arrival of visitors in the city they should call at this room, which will be duly advertised, and obtain the address, at parties having vacant rooms. Persons wishing to obtain rooms in advance should communicate with Mr Ward C. Pitfield, chairman of that Committee.
