Pte. Green, M. M. No. 147738, was headquarters runner for the 78th Battalion, Winnipeg Grenadiers. He was in the battle of the Somme, at Vimy Ridge, Passchendaele and Hill 70. He was one of the two chosen to represent the battalion at the Paris celebration last July 1. On Sept. 2 he suffered wounds near Arras, while delivering a message. He worked for Crescent Creamery Co. and lived with his mother at 511 Furby st. before going to war.

Bars-Janes.

An event of great interest to a large number of relatives and friends of both parties occurred on Tuesday afternoon, at five o'clock, at the residence of Dr. H. A. Payzant, Dartmouth, when Captain Geoffrey A. Bars, R. A. M. C. was united in marriage to Miss Eda Clara Janes, daughter of J. W. Janes, of Hants Harbor, Newfoundland. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Gordon P. Bars, of Tisbury, India, brother of the groom, who is home on furlough after seven years absence in India. The bride was given in marriage by Dr. Payzant. Only immediate relatives were present. The bride, dressed in a simple gown of white crepe de chene with veil and orange blossoms, and carrying a beautiful bridal bouquet of chrysanthemums and roses, and the groom in his uniform as Captain in the Guards Division, presented a charming and inspiring picture to the friends gathered at this pretty home wedding. A wedding supper followed the ceremony, after which the happy couple left by automobile on their honeymoon.

More than usual interest centers in this event. The groom, who a few days ago returned from the front on leave of absence, is a son of the late William L. Bars of the law firm of King and Bars. He has given three years of service at the front in the great war, and the bride, nearly two years, the groom was practicing medicine in Newfoundland, where he met his bride, when the war broke out. He offered his services to the Canadian government for medical work at the front; but owing to delay in receiving an appointment he crossed to England and was attached to the British authorities to the 19th Durham Light Infantry as Battalion Medical officer. This battalion experienced hard fighting and won distinction in the Somme battle. Subsequently Captain Bars was transferred to the Guards Division which also experienced much severe fighting. Here he served as Battalion Medical Officer and also in Field Ambulance work. He was through the Battle of the Somme, the Cambrai battle and his regiment helped to stop the German drive which began on March 21st of this year before being in minor battles. Captain Bars was twice mentioned in dispatches for courageous service during the Somme battle and the Cambrai battle. The bride who enlisted in 1916 as a V. A. D. nurse was also mentioned in dispatches by General Haig for heroic service during the bombing by the Germans of

Death's Harvest.

The death of Mrs. Pieman Huntley, formerly of Avonport, took place at the home of her son-in-law, Mr. Frank Bill, Billawa, on Saturday afternoon, Oct. 26th. Funeral services were held the following Monday afternoon. The service at home was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Whitman, of the United Baptist Church, and the address was given by Dr. A. C. Borden, Kentville, an intimate friend of Mrs. Huntley and her family. One daughter, Mrs. Bill, died some seven years ago and since that time Mrs. Huntley for the most part made her home with the son-in-law, Mr. Frank Bill, at Billawa. Mrs. Squarbridge, of Alberton, and Miss Laura, of Boston, and Miss Luiza, and Miss Susie, who reside in Boston, had reached home just in time for recognition by the mother before she passed away. Mrs. Huntley was a member of the Presbyterian church and was a woman who walked with God. Faithful as wife and mother and in her relation to God she commended herself favorably to all who had the privilege of her acquaintance. She was 70 years old. The number present at the home where the service was held was large and expressions of appreciation were heard from all. Interment was at the Methodist Cemetery, Horton. The service at the grave being conducted by the Rev. Mr. Miller, of Wolfville. The memory of the just is blessed.

Word has been received that Major (Rev.) George Wood, who went over with the 40th Battalion, has been promoted to Colonel. Colonel Wood is senior chaplain at Witley Camp, England. He was at one time pastor of the Methodist Presbyterian church and later pastor of the Denny and Bay View Presbyterian churches, and has many friends in both Annapolis and Digby counties.

NOTICE TO SOLDIERS ON HARVEST LEAVE.

Attention is directed to a recent announcement published in the Press by the Military Service Branch, Department of Justice, regarding extensions to be granted to men EXEMPTED AS FARMERS. It is pointed out that this DOES NOT IN ANY WAY AFFECT MEN WHO HAVE BEEN ORDERED BY THE REGISTRAR TO REPORT TO DEPOT BATTALIONS and who have thereafter received leave of absence from the Military Authorities. Once a man has been ordered to report for duty by the Registrar he leaves the jurisdiction of the Registrar and comes under that of the Department of Militia and Defence, and is to be considered as a soldier. This applies to men of the 20 to 22 Class who have been ordered to report by the Registrar in virtue of the cancellation of exemptions by Order-in-Council of the 20th April last, as well as to those ordered to report in the usual way on refusal of claim for exemption, or on expiration of exemption granted. All men, accordingly, who have been ordered to report, and are therefore SOLDIERS, and who have subsequently been granted harvest leave by the military authorities, MUST, NOTWITHSTANDING THE NOTICE ABOVE REFERRED TO, REPORT ON THE EXPIRATION OF THAT LEAVE, unless they are notified to the contrary by their Commanding Officer or by special notice published by the Department of Militia and Defence.


