BUGS INTERRUPTED BY POLICEMAN

Many Fires in Liverpool of Incendiary Origin — Well Plan-ned Holocaust

ONE YOUTH KILLED

Warned Police Regarding Suspicious Actions — Killed by Fleeing Men

London, Nov. 29.—Half a dozen men were preparing to set fire to a large lumber yard in the district of Finsbury, an important section of the city incident with the breaking out of incendiary fires in Liverpool.

The policeman challenged a loiterer, who immediately attacked the officer and shouted for help. Five men, with revolvers, answered the call and the policeman was compelled to liberate the man he had seized. One of the supposed incendiaries was later arrested. Cotton waste soaked with gasoline had been pushed through the gateway of the lumber yard. Two revolvers and 100 cartridges, were found.
