COUNTY COUNCIL

(Continued from last week)

The building committee, by its chairman Burt, submitted a report showing an expenditure on \$174.66, and an expenditure on \$430.85. Upon motion the report was adopted.

Flemming on behalf of a committee appointed to consider the question of expending money on the Houlton road, said he and ex-Coun. Caldwell had met Mr. Munro who said the sum of \$200 had been appropriated, on his responsibility, on the road, one half in the Parish of Woodstock and one half in the parish of Richmond. It was a small sum. We don't get any further grant. The appropriations had been made before we waited on Mr. Munro.

The report, on motion of Stevens, was received, and on motion the board was authorized to name another member in place of Caldwell.

Stevens thought that the committee should be authorized to wait on the government at Fredericton in the matter.

Alex Bell did not see the necessity of going to Fredericton. We could get at the members here.

Burt said there was quite a large sum of money spent in Carleton County. He was told, \$6000 between the three members.

Gallagher said the Houlton road was a disgrace. Its condition was the means of preventing many tourists from coming over this way and seeing the St. John valley. He believed it would be well for a delegation or the committee to go to the government. Generally the road along the river is in very good shape, but from Houlton to Woodstock the road is very bad.

Bell agreed that the road was very bad. I talked to Mr. Munro about some of the money not having been put on the road at the Houlton end. He said that would be practically impossible.

Lamont—For fear rumors go out that any of our members were to blame, it should be explained that they never handled the money. It was the fault of the commissioners. It is just possible that the money which should have been spent on the Houlton road was spent on some cross road. I knew the commissioners must render an account for every dollar spent. There is no possible way for the money to be switched off. I have taken it on me to fix roads and I will get my pay. I do not believe it would be any good to go to Fredericton.

Perry—I wanted to find out certain facts before a commissioner. I could not get anything from the Fredericton office but a report, no itemized account.

Lamont—Every dollar spent in Aberdeen can be accounted for. Perry—I could not find out anything.

Burt said the Glassville road is a good road.

Lamont—I believe the Councilors can have a large influence with the commissioners. If councilors get busy and leave politics out, they can get good results.

Phillips—I don't favor a delegation to Fredericton. I think as much good can be done by waiting on the members here. As far as expending \$5000 in the county, it only means a little in each parish. It would look as if it would be necessary to have a special grant to Houlton road.

Melville—There are receipts for all monies expended on roads, and under the present system, if any false reports are made, the man could be brought to book. If Coun. Perry went to the Public Works Office he could get all necessary information. It was not fair to insinuate money was going wrong, and not properly applied. It was sometimes difficult to make an account about statute labor.

Perry—I did not insinuate. I asked the question. I applied to the Minister of Public Works and he said they had sent me a full return. I could not make head or tail of it. It was not about statute labor. I was not suspicious but I wanted to know where the money went to.

Lamont said the provisions of the Act were such that it was almost impossible for money to be misappropriated.

I suppose Coun. Burt meant that the three members had \$5000 given them to spend individually. As I understand, all monies go through the commissioners.

Lamont—Every dollar.

Burt—I don't think this council is so thick-headed that this must be explained. This \$5000 was their money to expend in the county, not for their own use.

Melville—I move in amendment that that committee wait on the local members here.

Flemming—This is a very live question about the roads and the council will yet have to deal with the matter. We should appoint a committee of Council and wait on the government and formulate a plan for fixing the road. A good deal of money is worse than wasted, not necessarily misappropriated.

Melville spoke of a case in his parish where there was a bad bit of road, one of the members said he would see that it was fixed, and the commission promised to

do it but neglected to follow it up. I think if this matter is called to the attention of the members they will look after it.

Lamont said that he understood the government would especially take up the matter this session.

Gallagher said he was not anxious to put the county to expense but the three members were scattered. This Houlton road is a truck road and it is a disgrace. I think if we went personally and put the matter before the Minister of Public Works we could get a grant. We are more likely to succeed by going to Fredericton instead of waiting on the members here. It means much to this county in the way of paying tourist travel so have this road fixed and put in some sort of shape.

Moxon—If the road is not passable, like the Houlton road, and the commissioner went on and did the work, he believed the government would pay it. He spoke as a commissioner who had experience in this work.

The amendment carried. Miss Vince, on behalf of her brother, A. N. Vince, submitted the report of the County Auditor, as follows:

Since above report was completed the collector of Kent has paid Secty-Treasurer \$29.01, and the collector of Wicklow paid \$20.88. Also L. E. Young for jurors fees \$14. Therefore, the county owes Kent \$88.84 and Wicklow owes the county \$262.71.

Melville—The \$2000 in the Secretary's hands, is it all in cash? Sec.-Treas.—\$400 or \$500 would be in cash. The rest would be in jury fees and witness fees paid out. It would represent a surplus of about \$1500.

Report received and adopted. Morgan—All amounts are charged to different Parishes are they?

Sec.-Treas.—No. There are some amounts of pauper lunatics. Melville—How about Peel?

Sec.-Treas.—I could not tell you just now. But I can tell what has been assessed outside of certain cases, where private parties have agreed to sustain pauper lunatics and then have failed to do so.

Melville—I object to pauper lunatics being charged up to us without our knowing it. Simonds has a special way of getting out of this.

Perry—I enjoy my friend's talk, but Simonds takes care of all the lunatics it is entitled to.

Warden—I appoint Coun. Burt on the committee on the Houlton road question in place of Caldwell.

Election of County Officers then came up, resulting as follows:

Sec.-Treas.—J. C. Hartley. Auditor—A. N. Vince (during his absence Miss Vince to act.)

Reporter—T. C. L. Ketchum. Coun. Perry said the Patriotic Committee wished to wait on the

Council and he moved that they be heard tomorrow afternoon. Coun. Tompkins seconded the motion which carried.
