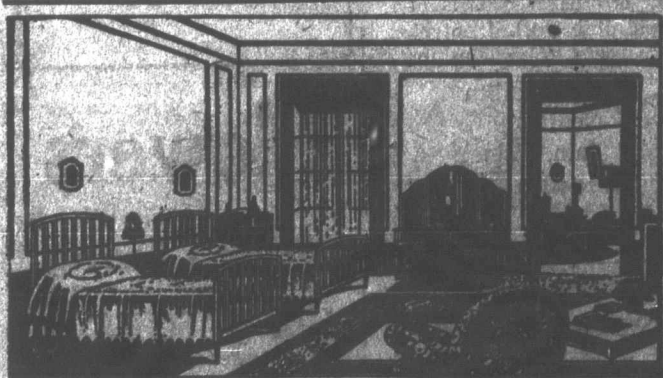

## LOST BOTH FEET BY CIRCULAR SAW

Terrible Calamity and an Unusual  
Surgical Operation—Well Known  
Man Victim of Accident

To have had both feet cut off by a circular saw was the awful experience of C. M. Hayward of Upper Brighton on Wednesday afternoon of last week. Not only did this calamity fall upon Mr. Hayward, but Archie Bubar who was assisting him in woodwork came literally within an inch of having his spinal column severed by the same saw. Mr. Hayward was engaged in sawing up fence rails for fire wood, using for the purpose a circular saw driven by a gasoline engine. He and his assistant were on top of a pile when the rails began rolling, precipitating both men on to the saw table. One of Mr. Hayward's feet was severed just above the shoe top, while the other was so terribly mangled that amputation was necessary.

Mr. Bubar had his clothing cut clear through to the skin just across the small of his back and his escape from death was marvelous. Dr. G. N. Belyea and Dr. W. B. Somerville were immediately summoned and with the assistance of Mrs. Belyea, R. N., a genuine triumph in surgery was accomplished. Dr. Belyea recalled that in all his hospital experience, he had never known recovery of a similar case where a double amputation was done under ordinary anaesthetics. His experience and judgment told him that to administer ether and thus adding burden to the shock already sustained by the patient, would in all probability prove fatal. Therefore he decided to resort to interspersal anaesthesia by means of novocaine. The injection was made at the fourth lumbar vertebra and in eight minutes the patient was absolutely insensate from that portion of his body downwards.

Mr. Hayward's suffering had previously been alleviated by a full dose of morphine and he was perfectly calm under the long operation, which he apparently took a deep interest in, asking questions and urging the surgeons not to hurry unduly as he felt all right. It may seem strange, almost uncanny, that when this serious operation began, Mr. Hayward requested his daughter, Miss Elisabeth, to play the piano to keep his attention from the ordeal through which he was passing, and when he observed the physicians were gathering up their instruments, he said "If you are all through, give me my pipe."

A week has elapsed and Mr. Hayward is making a good recovery with no set-back whatever, and having had no more severe physical shock than the immediate accident and the mental anguish by the knowledge of his unhappy misfortune. Mr. Hayward is past 50 years of age and the father of a large family. His many friends all over the county deeply sympathize with him and trust that his recovery may be speedy and steady and that soon he may be around with a pair of new feet, which the skillful artificers of today will be able to make for him. Drs. Belyea and Somerville are being congratulated upon the success of their unusual surgical procedure.

## THE PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME

Sunday, December 9 will be set aside in every Protestant church in New Brunswick as Orphans' Sunday, if the request of the Provincial Campaign Committee in charge of the campaign to raise \$250,000 for the Protestant orphans is carried out. Letters have been sent to every Protestant clergyman in the province requesting that this be done, that special sermons be preached at the services on that day stressing the responsibility of the Protestant people for the proper care of the little unfortunates who have been left as orphans. It is believed that this plan will be generally carried out and with this as a prelude to the great drive to start Monday, December 10, the Provincial Campaign Committee have no doubts as to the measure of the response from the Protestant people who are aroused as never before. This is by far the greatest Protestant movement in the history of New Brunswick and there is every indication that the stigma that the Protestants do not properly provide for their orphans will be wiped out with a generous response that a record for giving will be established of which the whole province will be proud.

Local campaign organizations have been formed in nearly every county in the province and it is confidently believed that before the end of this week the whole of New Brunswick will be thoroughly organized and ready for the great effort. Wherever organizations have been effected the most prominent people have gladly assumed the responsibility for raising the local quotas and are taking up the work with an enthusiasm that insures success. The movement is gaining strength and momentum daily and there is no doubt as to the outcome.
