

erected or constructed thereon or in connection therewith any public work within the meaning of the Expropriation Act.

2. The government of Canada may at all times, without compensation to the government of the province, take possession of, erect, construct and maintain any public work within the meaning of the Expropriation Act, upon any lands transferred under the provisions of the foregoing act, so long as the lands required are vested in the crown.

3. The provincial government shall not, except with the consent of the government general in council, grant or otherwise dispose of, to any person or company, any land covered by Canadian navigable waters which lies within two hundred feet of the outer limits of boundaries of any existing public work, within the meaning of the Expropriation Act, provided that the lands upon which such public work has been erected or constructed are in whole or in part bounded by or form part of lands covered by navigable waters.

4. All patents, leases or other dispositions of the foreshore or bed of a navigable water made by the government of Canada, prior to any transfer under the foregoing act, in respect to lands other than those referred to in clause one shall be, so far as the provincial government has power so to do, ratified and confirmed.

5. The transfer by the foregoing act authorized shall not be construed to give to a provincial government, or to persons claiming under it, any rights in respect to navigation or to the sea-coast and inland fisheries, the rights of all parties in respect to navigation and shipping, and in respect to the fisheries, remaining unaffected thereby.

Mr. Davies and Mr. Mills made some observations approving the bill, which passed without opposition.

The house adjourned early after putting through committee the bill about the shipment of cattle.

The minister of justice explained that doubts having existed as to whether the provisions of the bill, which were referred to the committee, were in fact in the bill, it was important that questions as to the validity of the bill should be settled, and it was proposed that the committee should make certain suggestions and reservations transfer to the provinces whatever rights it might have.

OTTAWA, Aug. 18.—The first business of the session today was the Northwest act, after which the order of the day respecting Thomas McGreevey was taken up. That member was not present in obedience to the summons. After the speaker had read returns showing that the summons had been served, Sir John Thompson moved that the sergeant at arms be authorized to take Mr. McGreevey into custody and bring him to the house. Motion passed.

Hon. Mr. Foster moved the house into committee of ways and means for the purpose of considering resolutions respecting customs and excise duties on ale, beer and porter made from sugar, corn and rice. This change is due to the doubling up of the order of the day, giving an advantage to Canadian produce of beer from sugar and other articles. A corresponding increase in the duty on ale, beer and porter is proposed. The rate on beer made from malt will now be six cents, while that on sugar is four cents.

Mr. Gayer complained that the bill authorized the manufacture of beer from sugar. This was inferior beer, and the government change of duty would deprive the farmers of part of their barley market.

Hon. Mr. Foster admitted that he was not himself an expert authority on the quality of beer. He could state, however, that the brewers always had the privilege of making beer from sugar, and that the present bill compelled them to pay more excise duty than formerly.

After further explanations the resolutions passed.

A discussion then ensued as to the effect on Canada of the treaty between the United States and Spain. The discussion concluded, the minister of finance made another attempt to get into supply when he was headed off by a want of confidence motion proposed by the leader of the opposition.

Mr. Laurier's complaint was that settlers on lands in certain districts in British Columbia had not received with-

their grants of lands the right to end and other minerals.

Hon. Mr. Hargrave closed the debate and the vote was taken at 11 o'clock. The result was:

Yea, 81
Nay, 101

The number of members voting was the same as on the last day of voting. The house then went into supply.

New York, Aug. 22.—At 12:30 this afternoon an explosion occurred in the 5-story brick building 68 and 70 Park place occupied by John C. Elbert. The explosion was immediately followed by fire and the building collapsed in a few minutes. From all that can be learned fully fifty people lost their lives. The accident came so suddenly that not a single person in the building escaped.

The fire spread to 247 Greenwich street, a five-story brick building. The cause is said to be the explosion of the boiler. It is not known how many were in the building, but of the number only two men are known to have escaped.

The adjoining buildings on College Place and Park Place are shattered and burning. All available fire engines and apparatus are on the scene. An eye witness says that seven persons passing in front of the building at the time of the explosion were knocked down by the shock, and before they recovered the wall fell on them. He believes they are killed.

New York, Aug. 21.—The work of the fire department in the ruins of Park Place continued through the night. The body of a man was found beneath a heavy press and it will be impossible to remove it until a derrick be obtained to hoist the press from the ruins. Up to 7 o'clock five bodies had been found making 21 in all. All the bodies discovered last night were terribly mangled and unrecognizable.

THE TECTONIC'S GREAT RUN.

New York, Aug. 15.—The Tectonic left Queensdown at forty-eight minutes past one o'clock on August 13. At five minutes past two o'clock the vessel passed Diamond rocks. From this point the voyage proper began. The following are the daily runs: Friday, 4:00; Saturday, 5:00; Sunday, 5:00; Monday, 6:00; Tuesday, 5:17. At 1:30 o'clock the noble craft had the Sandy Hook light-house astern. When the voyage was completed the Tectonic covered 2778 miles. This is the fastest trip on record. The Tectonic, which previously held the record, made the run in five days, 18 hours, 8 minutes.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Mr. Gladstone in a letter to the Liberal candidate for Lewisham, says:—“I feel Salisbury delivered recently a speech which appears to mean that, if at the coming election the nation pronounced in favor of home rule for Ireland, that body, which would be equally a boon to each of the three kingdoms is to be frustrated by what he terms the play of the other parts of the constitution, that is to say the House of Lords will reject it. It is for you to decide how to receive this threat to overthrow the judgment which during the last four years has been so unequivocally declared. I trust you will be enabled to show that the sense of the people is evident elsewhere, is shared by the metropolitan and that the electors of Lewisham will perform their share in closing a controversy injurious to every interest of the empire.”
