MILITARY SCHOOL.

The Opening at the Drill Shed.

In accordance with the recent Government order, schools of military instruction were opened at Toronto, Montreal and St. John, N. B., on Wednesday last. These schools are especially intended to allow officers holding Provincial commissions in the Active Militia an opportunity of obtaining the certificate of qualification required by the militiaregulations of last year, and consequently no non-commissioned officer or private is eligible for admission. The school at Toronto is open to the officers of any battalion in Ontario, and is under the immediate supervision of Lieut. Col. Durie, D.A.G., Lieut. Col. Denison, B.M., acting as Adjutant, and Sergeant Moulton as Drill Instructor. In order to facilitate matters connected with the school, the Brigade office has been temporarily removed from the Old Fort to the drill shed, where it occupies the rooms adiotted to the efficers of the 10th Royals, who have kindly piaced them at the disposal of the staff. The present class contains representatives from all parts of the Frovince, and as the number of officers to be admitted is limited to fifty, it would be well for those intending to enter to have their names forwarded at once. The course will embrace the usual military drill, duties and discipline, with lectures on the internal economy of a regiment, and, to secure a certificate, the candidate must be able to take entire charge of a company, both at drill and in Sattalion movements. Officers residing in the city receive no personal allowance for the time they are under instruction, but those residing at a distance of two miles or more from the city are allowed seventy-five conting no distinguishing uniform work wills attending the School, but each officer must provide himself with these.
