## HOME RULE FOR IRELAND

The Struggle of a Century For Political Rights  
By Wm. Halley

For the length of a lifetime the writer of this has been a student of the Irish question, with his sympathies strongly for the Irish people. In Daniel O'Connell's time he read O'Connell's and Shiel's speeches and learned of some of the grievances the Irish people were laboring under then. He was born and brought up among them and knew there was but little or no exaggeration in what those great orators stated. O'Connell, however, made the mistake a leader of abusing the Saxon, and made enemies of the English people. There were some exceptions for this by provocations received. Lord Lyndhurst said in the House of Lords "the Irish were aliens in race, in language and in religion," and gave it as a reason why the English people did not like them, and that gave Lalor Shiel the opportunity for one of his most celebrated retorts in the House of Commons, when he defended the Irish by asking Lord Lyndhurst to "go ask Arthur Duke of Wellington if their blood or their religion kept them from fighting for the empire, and gave him an army of Irishmen in the Peninsula which was not surpassed in the history of the world for bravery, and overthrew the legions of the great Napoleon in many a battle." So there was during O'Connell's time a racial as well as a political warfare carried on between the two peoples, and when the Irish papers went over to England in the harvest time they were often chased and driven away by the English workmen, and it was difficult for the Irish who sought employment in the cities to get it because of the prejudices that prevailed against them, and "no Irish need apply" was invariably found at the end of every "want" advertisement in the London Times and other English newspapers. The lot of the Irish people was very hard. Bad government in their domestic affairs put them at a great disadvantage. They were ignorant because the government begrudged them educational facilities; they were impoverished because they had to pay exorbitant rents to landlords and church tithes to the ministers of a church they did not believe in. There were no sanitary conditions existing to safeguard the health of the people, and many farmhouses were insanitary, as there were no public places for demoralized people. They were encouraged to become drunkards that the coffers of the government might be kept replenished by the excise duty on spirits, and their burdens were so great and their relief so distant that they naturally took to drink to drown their sorrows. But even then they were considered one of the most light-hearted people in Europe. A man of genius under other conditions that might be mentioned to keep the poor of Ireland in misery did space permit on the occasion call for their recital. In the north the Catholic Irish were continually assailed to keep them from getting hold of the land, so that what the Orange institution was first principally founded for—to keep them from getting hold of the land.

Within my time the first great grievance attempted to be remedied was that of the imposition of tithes, which were shifted from the tenants to the landlords, who, however, responded by increasing the rents when opportunity offered.

The sanitary and domestic affairs were nearly as bad, I suppose in England as they were in Ireland, as British governments in those days were neither scientific nor domestic. The men being taken up so much with wars and conquests; and being chosen from the landed gentry, who were not considered in the transaction, although Daniel O'Connell, their leader, became a free trader. This, I suppose, he did to get the support of the free traders for the Irish cause.

The electoral franchise in Ireland was then very limited and was made more so by disfranchising "the forty-shilling freeholders" in exchange for Catholic emancipation. The Tory landlords, having all their way, were able to carry even the most Catholic and Liberal constituencies, and for a long time no Catholic was eligible for membership in Parliament. And it was a good while after emancipation was granted before the Catholics were able to muster a fair representation, and that after repeated struggles and failures. Thomas W. P. who was elected member of Parliament for Waterford, succeeded after a while in getting a modicum of school facilities for Ireland; but the commissioners seemed to delight in making the rules and conditions as un-English as they could. Even Sir Walter Scott's poem "Hail, Caledonia, stern and wild," had "breadstuffs here a man with soul so dead," stricken out of it, in a volume of poetry published by the commissioners, for fear it might infect the Irish. The school established by the government were called "national schools," when in fact they were as anti-national as ingenuity could make them. Nothing was done to conform to Irish ideas.

The means of subsistence was the least and cheapest, the cheapest products that could be produced. It never entered the craniums of statesmen or scientists that these might give out some time. But they did, and strange to say, the calamity that bore so hard on the Irish was a benefit to the English, because it compelled Sir Robert Peel, then Prime Minister, to re-

## THE METHODISTS ENDORSE LEAGUE

For Temperance and Moral Reform in the Province. Conference in Session.

Calgary, May 24.—At today's session of the Methodist Conference of Alberta, a fraternal telegram from the British Columbia conference, now being held at Vernon, B.C., was read. The secretary of the Alberta conference was ordered to return a suitable reply.

A communication from Rev. P. W. Nicoll, C. of the Canadian Church at Medicine Hat, with regard to instituting religious instruction in public schools, was also read and a committee drafted to act upon it. A motion was made by Rev. G. G. Weber, of Ingham, that Calgary Central Church be set apart as a church for special mission work in view of the nature of work being done and proposed to be done. This motion was unanimously carried.

Another communication was received regarding the establishment of a new church paper for the western provinces. The matter was referred to a committee. It was decided to hold memorial services Saturday forenoon for Rev. Frederick Laing Ford, B.A., and Rev. Frederick Corri, B.A. A motion was carried that the temperance and moral reform league be recognized as an official inter-denominational organization of the province and given support for promotion of aggressive temperance work, and that ministers and laymen of the church render all possible and reasonable assistance towards the accomplishment of this by giving the privilege to the field secretary of speaking in churches and making collections. This was referred to the committee of the reform league.

From the Edmonton district delegates a protest was read regarding the increase of the license area in Northern Alberta.

On Monday night next Dr. Woodsworth will be requested to address the conference. At the evening public meeting the names of those who will be ordained as ministers at the ordination services Saturday forenoon were given. Those present were J. N. Wilkinson, E. J. Tale, C. W. Bishop, B.A. The names of the absent ones will be ordained are Geo. W. Sharling, B.A., Robert Pearson, and James B.A., Richard O. Jolliffe, B.A., Robert S. Longley, D.D.

Ottawa, May 22.—In view of the numerous requests from this country and from abroad for information on the mining and metallurgical industries of Canada and the need of such a publication to bring the mining and metallurgical industries of the Dominion in touch with the newly created department of mines, the minister, Mr. William Lemieux, has authorized the collection of authentic and reliable information for a report on this industry. It will cover the whole country and will give the following information: Name of company, date of incorporation and charter, authorized capital, value of shares, directors and officers, head office, Canadian office, number of men employed, wages, transportation facilities, market and prices. The following additional information is sought regarding the mining industry: Mining land owned and controlled, class and character of ore mined, average quality of ore analyzed, method of mining, treatment of ore, if any, cost of mining, (drilling), explosives, hoisting, transportation, general expenses, total cost per ton of ore raised.
