A Grand Response.

The response to the call for Aeroplanes has been grand. On Thursday last the first short list of subscriptions was published. Last night the fund amounted to over \$12,000, and in addition to this the Reid brothers promised to subscribe for an aeroplane themselves. The gift of the Reid brothers is a fine one, and will doubtless spur on others to do their "bit." The gifts are to be representative of the whole people. All are invited to do their part. No matter how small the subscription, it will be as welcome as the big subscription. It is also the wish of those that are managing that the subscription shall be purely voluntary. The desire is to raise the money without appointing canvassers to go round and beg for subscriptions. The Reid brothers have been sent to societies, unions and business houses and factories, in order that the members of institutions and employers of labor be afforded an opportunity to give what they can. Communications have also been sent to Magistrates throughout the island, asking them to afford opportunities for the people in their neighborhood to subscribe. The means of drawing the attention of the people in the city are manifold. Every one who passes the window of the Board of Trade can see how the subscription is going up by watching the hand on the dial placed there. The sum aimed at is \$24,000, without counting the Reid-Newfoundland aeroplane which will be the personal gift of the three Reid brothers. One large aeroplane has already been subscribed for by the general public, and a substantial sum raised towards a second one. It is the intention to present two 100 H. P. gnomes Vickers gun aeroplanes, completely equipped and ready for the fray. We ask each one of our readers to ask himself or herself: "What can I do?" You can do something. It may be little. But every dollar counts, so does every coin. Five twenty cents make a dollar. Two fifties make a dollar. And it all mounts up. Newfoundland can now buy a "Reid-Newfoundland aeroplane," and a "Newfoundland aeroplane." Another is wanted. By a combined effort it will be obtained, and by August 4th, let Newfoundland present the King with all three.

Impressions of Pouch Cove.

Like other nearby settlements of the Capital, the dwellings and surroundings of Pouch Cove are picturesque and comfortable, and the reward of industry may be seen on every side. This speaks well for the people, and also for their leaders and spiritual directors.

Amongst the different new buildings which attracted our attention, we noticed the Methodist Parsonage, which is occupied by the Rev. W. H. Browning, and which is indeed a very comfortable and commodious dwelling. We enquired from the good Pastor as to who had erected the building, and what it had cost, and he informed us that it was all done in such a short time, and with so few preliminaries or resolutions, that he looks upon it as a monument to the enthusiasm and co-operation of his congregation, who, early in March, informed him that if he wished to have a new Parsonage built, they would have it ready for him within three months. The kind offer was of course accepted, and success crowned the undertaking. Some men went to the forest and cut the framing, others prepared the foundation, and others came to the city, and carted down the finer work of the building. Many hands make light work, and very soon the key was handed to the good Pastor.

The building and its entire surroundings are a credit to the Methodist people of Pouch Cove, and a great comfort to the Pastor and his good wife, and is a practical expression of the good feeling which exists between the congregation and the minister. During our visit, we saw Pouch Cove at its best, and the residents appeared contented and happy. The homes and buildings of such places as Pouch Cove represent the toil and industry of its people, and these are the best asset which any country can possess; and the same conditions exist throughout our Island Home, North, South, East and West.—Com.

Nascopie Back.

With Big Cargo of Salt—Ship will go to Hudson Bay.

The S.S. Nascopie, Capt. Melkle, returned to port last night, after an absence of nearly three months, bringing 2,025 tons of salt to Job Bros. After leaving here the ship went to St. John, N.B., and loaded deals for a port in the Bristol Channel, thence proceeding to Newport and loaded coal for Gibraltar, after which she went to Cadiz and loaded salt for here, making the passage in eight days, which was an exceptionally quick run. The S.S. Bellenby left Cadiz three days ahead of the Nascopie, but has not yet put in an appearance. The arrival of the Nascopie's cargo has been eagerly awaited and it will, no doubt, greatly relieve the prevailing salt famine.

After unloading the Nascopie will go to Hudson Bay, a charter for that region, we understand, having been made.

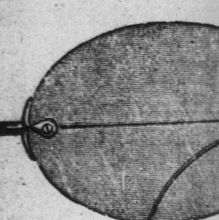
