against manual labor as servile, they will have succeeded in doing at least one good thing, and, when they finally pass away, they will leave behind them a name 'link'd to one virtue and a hundred crimes.'

Trotsky the Superman.

"The irony of Trotsky's position is that he leads now the same kind of life which he denounced others for leading. He is a superman who spends his days signing papers, presiding over committees, receiving deputations, just as Stolypin did. His boy is getting a far better education than any of the common herd, and will, if he and Bolshevism survive, stand a much better chance of obtaining a good Governmental position when he comes of age than any of the bolshevik rank and file, or even than any scion of our great governing families in this country. Like all the other Commissars, Trotsky is surrounded by swarms of loaders and place-hunters for whom he must find jobs, irrespective of their merit. I found the keenest competition for the spoils of office going on among the smaller fry, and several candidates confessed to me that nobody but friends and relations of the great Commissars stand any chance. About a year ago Sverdlov, a powerful Commissar died; and his brother succeeded him simply because he was his brother, a thing which could hardly happen in English Cabinet politics."

Getting a Trouser-Button.

Captain McCullagh says that the muddle in Russia exasperates even the marvellously patient people who have been accustomed for centuries to the most exaggerated forms of officialism. "One man told me that if he lost a button off his trousers he would have first of all to get a permit from the 'House Committee.' Then he would have to bring that permit to a Commissar. Then he would have to go to a Government Department which would give him an order on a Government store. Then he would wait all day in a queue outside that Government store only to find, when his turn came, that it had given out all its buttons, and that he would have to go to a similar store at the other end of the town and wait all day in a queue there. A button in the offertory is consequently a source of unmitigated joy to the impetuous Russian and Polish priests, for a whole plateful of the paper-money and postage stamps which are given liberally by the faithful would not buy as much as a packet of cigarettes."

He often told the Bolsheviks that if a Government like that were established in England the workers themselves or their wives would sweep it away in twenty-four hours.—John O'London's Weekly.

A Modern Draco.

No Spooning in Antos, Says this Judge.

Attleboro, Mass., Aug. 2.—The first case against "spooning autoists" was heard before Judge C. C. Hagerty in the District Court last week when Joseph R. Paquette of Pawtucket, R.I., was fined \$5.00 for allowing another person to interfere with the proper operation of his automobile. Patrolman C. E. Nolan testified that Paquette was driving a machine through South Attleboro with one arm around the waist of a feminine companion and that the girl had an arm entwined about Paquette's neck. "We often have cases here of persons operating an automobile while under the influence of liquor," commented Judge Hagerty, "but this defendant was under the influence of something else equally as dangerous."

Words That Miss Their Way.

Words have a fatal habit of taking the wrong turning. In certain old versions of the Bible Christ is called "the ringleader of our salvation," a word changed later to "captain," whilst Paul called himself the "knave" or "lad" of Christ. Similarly, in old church books, the Virgin is described as "God's wench." The words "crafty" and "artful," which invariably carry an unpleasant meaning, used to mean skilful and artistic, while the word "blackguard" was formerly quite an honorable term. It referred to the humble but perfectly reputable calling of carrying coal in the King's household. Three hundred years ago an officious man was one who was always ready to do offices of kindness. A pagan was a rustic, and a heathen was one who dwelt on a heath. Our word "silly," now an insult, is in old manuscripts applied to the Babe of Bethlehem. He is called the "harmless, silly babe," word "silly" meaning "blessed." The word "charity" is one which has come an awful cropper. It is used almost exclusively nowadays to mean dependence upon doles and gifts, while the word "imperialism" has gone through a remarkable change. It now means "cheeky." Originally it meant a remark that was not pertinent to the subject under discussion, and gradually got to mean a remark to be resented.

"If his (McGrath's) mother, who did not grudge his services in the Great War, who was proud of his having won his commission, with the Military Cross, on the battlefield, respectfully beg that the hand of justice be tempered with mercy; and, we his father and brothers, do not ask for vengeance but ask that true consolation will be afforded to us all in your giving effect to what we earnestly believe would have been the last request of the late district inspector—that the man who spared and protected his prisoners should be spared and protected when a prisoner himself."—Manchester Guardian.
