Voltaire's Wealth.

The famous French satirical writer, Voltaire, was worth \$500,000 at 40 years old. But he did not earn his money from books. He made most of it by lending money to needy nobles. He would lend a hair to an idiot, a large sum on condition that the hair should pay him 10 per cent interest on the amount as long as

both of them lived. The hair would be neither required nor allowed to pay off the principal; and the agreement ended only when Voltaire died. Voltaire picked only younger men and because of his tubercular appearance had no difficulty in getting clients. It is said that when a prospective borrower hesitated the satirist could count in a way that always closed the deal. The scheme was very successful for Voltaire.—The Mentor.

Paris Gave Poincare Popular Reception.

Twelve Thousand Coal Miners Strike in N. S.—Baxter and Barrett Defeated in U. M. W. Elections—Nationalists Oust Irregulars From Killarney—Dublin Mourns Death of Griffith.

OVATION TO POINCARE.

PARIS, Aug. 15. Premier Poincare was given a tremendous popular ovation here on arrival from London this evening.

SOFT COAL STRIKE ENDED.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 15. Immediate resumption of coal production in bituminous mines scattered over seven states was ordered to-night, and in some places cutting of coal will be started tomorrow. Orders for miners to return to work were sent by District Union officials after the operators had signed an agreement renewing the wage contracts that were in force when the men quit the mines on March 31. President John L. Lewis of the miners, said that operators controlling an annual output of approximately 60,000,000 tons had signed the agreement. The agreement between operators and miners in Cleveland will result in general acceptance of their terms throughout the coal mining industry and a nation wide end of a strike, notwithstanding the relatively small representation of operators at the Cleveland Conference, officials of the National Coal Association declared to-day.

THE N.S. COAL STRIKE.

SYDNEY, Aug. 15. Twelve thousand coal miners are on strike. Defeat is conceded of three of the four principal executive officers of the Nova Scotia District of United Mine Workers in to-day's District elections, and the election of the so-called radical slate. Despatch of two hundred and fifty troops from Halifax to Cape Breton and quiet in the strike area were the principal features of reports received tonight of the Nova Scotia coal mine strike which started at midnight. Pumperman and protection men, who were

not already on strike, were called out at midnight except at Inverness, Cape Breton. Mines there are very wet and it is not known yet whether Pumperman will be taken out or not. No report has been made of any opposition on the part of the men to manning the pumps by company officials, etc., which has taken place in some mines. President Robert Baxter and International Board Member Silby Barrett were defeated in to-day's election, with Secretary Treasurer J. M. McLachlan re-elected. These have been known as the big three, who have dominated mine politics in Nova Scotia for many years. Some months ago McLachlan disagreed with Baxter and Barrett on McLachlan's "strike on the job" policy and other questions, and have since headed the so-called Radical and Conservative factions. W. P. DeLassy, Vice-President who opposed McLachlan for Secretary, was among the defeated to-day. Dan Livingstone, Westville, Pictou County, is the new President. Election of the "Radical" slate is conceded to-night, by a vote of five to one.

KILLARNEY OCCUPIED.

DUBLIN, Aug. 15. Killarney, the last position of importance in County Kerry held by Irregulars has been occupied by the National army.

DUBLIN DEEPLY MOURNS.

DUBLIN, Aug. 15. The body of Arthur Griffith, late President of Dail Eireann, lies on the Catafalque before the Altar, in the Cathedral. It was taken to the Cathedral to-night from the City Hall where it had been lying in state, followed by a cortege, which constituted one of the most impressive spectacles in Irish history. All Dublin, it would seem, with bowed heads had assembled along the route of the procession.

She leaves one son, George F. printer of this city. Four daughters, Miss Annie, of this city, Mrs. Philip Murphy, Newcastle, N.B., Mrs. P. J. Turner, Bay of Islands, Mrs. (Dr.) J. N. McDonald, besides an adopted son, James Miles, one sister, Mrs. John Burke, and three brothers, Patrick, Thomas and James Miron. To the family the Telegram extends sympathy in this, their hour of bereavement.

Escaped Lunatic Found.

The man has been missing since Sunday, last and when discovered was comfortably quartered in a shack he had built with boughs. The unfortunate was escorted to the Police Station last night and after identification was sent back to the Asylum.

CONCLUDING MEETINGS.

The concluding series of meetings in connection with the Congress were conducted yesterday by Commissioner and Mrs. Sowton, all the city and visiting officers being present. The first meeting of the day was held at 10.30 and was opened with singing and prayer. The Commissioner then spoke for upwards of an hour and a half on matters vitally affecting the life and work of the Salvation Army officers. To say that he was listened to attentively is putting it very mildly, for the officer literally drank in the words and the result will undoubtedly be seen in more aggressive and enthusiastic work in the various Corps around the island. At 2 p.m. Mrs. Sowton held a meeting for women officers only, when she gave some splendid advice and counsel to the women on matters pertaining to their particular responsibilities. She spoke of the splendid opportunity which the Army affords women of working for God and humanity, and urged the women of the Salvation Army in Newfoundland to be true to their trust. The women officers were deeply grateful to Mrs. Sowton for her thoughtful kindness in arranging this meeting especially for them; one woman was heard to say after the meeting: "You can't help liking her, she's so kind."

At 7 p.m. the final meeting of the Congress was held when the Commissioner again spoke at considerable length on various matters of intense interest to his hearers, as some one remarked the best wine was kept till the last, the meeting being in many respects the best of the series. The Commissioner was in fine form and his words made a deep impression on the hearts of his hearers. At the conclusion of his address a prayer meeting was held, which was a time of deep heart searching. Vows were renewed and covenants entered into which will have an effect not only on those present, but upon those whom they come in contact with in the places where they will labour during the coming year.

During the evening Colonel Martin referred to the blessing the Commissioner had been doing the Congress and called upon Commandant Salisbury and Mrs. Adjutant Hillier to voice the sentiments of the men and women officers respectively in this connection. They assured the Commissioner that the visit and message was greatly appreciated and that they would be warmly welcomed whenever they could make it possible to pay another visit. The Commissioner replied stating that it was a great pleasure for him and Mrs. Sowton to come to Newfoundland and that they would be delighted to come back again at some future date if circumstances would permit.

Colonel Martin desires to thank the Comrades and friends who so kindly entertained the officers during the Congress and helped to make their stay pleasant, also to the management of the Majestic Theatre for the use of their building on Sunday last and to the Press for courtesies extended.—COM.
