

Additional Boston Service.

Messrs. A. E. Hickman & Co., Ltd. have received a message stating that S.S. Anna would be leaving Boston on the 20th inst. for this port. The following clipping from the Boston Marine Guide, of June 17th, refers to the above named ship:

"Another new service linking Boston with Halifax and St. John's, and interior points via these ports, is announced by the Boston, Halifax and Newfoundland Steamship Co., recently incorporated in Massachusetts. Officers have been named as follows: President Alfred H. Post, Vice Pres. Sidney Hoey, Treasurer, Wm. D. Van derbilt, Dock Supt., Augustus A. Nelson. Offices will be on Commercial wharf and the telephone number is Richmond 2274.

The Norwegian steamer "Anna," now at Commercial Wharf, is expected to sail about June 15th on the initial voyage and about every 15 days thereafter. The "Anna" is reported as being rated 300 A.L. Lloyd's highest rating, and to have a speed of 12 knots per hour, which should enable this vessel to easily make the scheduled fortnightly sailings."

Poultry Culture Lecture.

Friday night the following members of this Association motored to Kelligrews, and lectured on "Poultry Culture." In the school there, viz. Messrs. Herbert M. Winter, Errol Munn, W. D. McCarter, Judge Walter Clayton, W. R. Butler, George R. Williams, A. J. Bayly. The Rev. Hugh Facey, Rector of Kelligrews, was Chairman, and introduced the speakers. The audience was keenly interested and appreciative. Some hundred and fifty pictures were shown by the aid of a lantern. Mr. A. J. Bayly, Secretary of the Department of Agriculture, was the first speaker on "Agriculture," and referred specially to the cultivation of potatoes and potato diseases, showing slides illustrating his remarks. After Mr. Bayly, Secretary McCarter, W. R. Butler, Judge Walter Clayton and President Williams followed on the various subjects of poultry culture. Mr. W. R. Butler's address was excellent, and in reference to eggs from pure bred and no breed fowls, showed that four eggs of good hens equalled the weight of six eggs of ordinary scrub hens—and proved to his audience with scales on the platform, showing that eggs are not all alike in value some being worth more than others—and to be just, eggs should be sold by weight and not by count. This lecture occupied two hours. At the close a vote of thanks was passed to the visitors and four settings of pure bred eggs were distributed free to four different members of the audience. The Association wishes to thank Mr. Errol Munn and Mr. Herbert Facey for the country given. Five model poultry houses have been built at Kelligrews and the Association hopes for good results as being the outcome of their visit.—Com.

Rodolph Valentino at Nickel To-Night.

NEW INGRAM PLAY ON BALZAC THEME.

"The Conquering Power" is announced by the Nickel Theatre for three days, beginning to-day. It is a Rex Ingram production for Metro, and in it Mr. Ingram has had the assistance of all the principals who aided him in making "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" the superb production that it was. At its New York premier, "The Conquering Power" was acclaimed with unmitigated enthusiasm. The cast is headed by Rodolph Valentino and Alice Terry.

It is an adaptation by June Mathis of Balzac's novel, "Eugenie Grandet." The scene is laid in a provincial city of France, where the miserly old Grandet hoards his gold and lives in poverty with his daughter, Eugenie. A nephew, Charles, a young boulevardier from Paris, son of a bankrupt suicide, is thrown upon the miser's charity—and is accordingly thrown out, shipping to Martinique with little money, but with the treasured memory of Eugenie's love. This is the beginning of Balzac's tremendous story of love and greed.

In the screen version Alice Terry, the exquisitely beautiful Marguerite of "The Four Horsemen," has scored a sensational triumph through her portrayal of Eugenie. Rodolph Valentino, whose Latin temperament and graceful fascination fitted him perfectly for the role of Julio in "The Four Horsemen," is cast as the Parisian dandy, Charles. Ralph Lewis, one of the most effective of character actors, plays old Grandet. The photography is by John F. Selix and the technical directors are Ralph Barton and Ames Myers.

Obsequies of Miss Lindsay.

"I am the Resurrection and the Life."—With these comforting words, Rev. Canon Holt opened the brief but appropriate service at Oke's Mortuary Rooms, yesterday morning, over the body of Miss Marguerite Lindsay before the removal of the remains to the railway station en route to Montreal for interment. It was a sad and solemn service and the mourners were visibly impressed. The Scripture Lesson, read by the Canon, contained a message of hope, and the thoughts of the mourners were divided between the scene in the mortuary rooms and the home of the deceased. In spite of the coldness of death there was the thought of the happy re-union after this life when parting and pain and sorrow will be known no more. Newfoundland has been linked to the Sister Dominion by many ties of death. Recently, in the past, the writer has stood in the presence of the Grim Reaper, but seldom has sorrow been so evident as yesterday. The passing of Miss Lindsay has caused universal regret. In the sweetness and bloom of her young life, for she was only 21, she made the greatest sacrifice of all—given her life—that the unknown, or practically unknown world might be better. Such sacrifices during the Great War, elicited the highest praise; the action of Miss Lindsay compares with the most noble. She left a loving and most comfortable home, for the far north to carry sunshine and happiness to the many dark and aching hearts, and while in the discharge of that noble duty she met an early death. The sad circumstances of her death I shall not refer to. The world will be satisfied to know that she went out full of goodness and greatness of human kindness, and in a few short months returned empty, having given all for the poor and needy. Let me correct myself—NOT EMPTY—for there is in store for her a crown of glory. The little orphans of the bleak and lonely Labrador are better off and happier because of her presence, and she will be known to future generations as the "Winifreding Angel." All this love and sympathy could do in St. John's was done. Funeral Director Oke, his son Gordon and their staff, could not have been more sympathetic and painstaking. With the greatest care they re-arranged the body for burial, embalming it and enclosing it in a pretty white casket, emblematic of the sweetness and goodness of her young life. The chief mourner was the Rev. Henry Gordon, the great Missionary of Carriagway, whose grief since the tragedy has been very poignant; among the mourners there was also noted Mr. J. A. Paddon, Manager of the Bank of Montreal; R. G. Reid Esq., of the Reid Newfoundland Co., Hon. S. Miller, a close friend of the deceased young lady. His Honor the Mayor, Hon. Tasker Cook, who was out of town, was represented by Councillor Baz Dowling; Dr. Robinson, Mr. Windler, Manager of the Commercial Cable Co., Mr. Gerald Joffe, Mr. E. Lewis of the pilot service, Mr. E. Wills of A. Harvey and Company's and J. Lockyer, were among some of the prominent citizens present. The casket was covered with beautiful wreaths. As the cortege slowly wended its way to the railway station, citizens stood with uncovered heads, evidencing their respect for the departed heroine, and sympathy for the sorrowing relatives at home. Marguerite Lindsay will rank with the great women of the world who have given their lives for others. She has gone to her reward, but her life will be held in sweet memory.

Reported Missing.

POLICE SEARCH FOR YOUNG MAN AND WOMAN.

Mr. Charles Murphy reported to the police this morning that Frank Thistle of the Cove Road and Miss Florence Whelan of Boncloddy Street, two members of a basket party which spent yesterday in the vicinity of Middle Pond, Bay Bulls, were missing.

According to the story told the police by Mr. Murphy himself with Mr. and Mrs. James Clancy, Frank Thistle, Mrs. Annie Moran, Central Street, and Miss Whelan left early Sunday by motor to spend the day there. The party spent some time in the afternoon fishing at Middle Pond, and at 6 p.m. all started to return by a path-way through the undergrowth to where they had put up. Thistle and Miss Whelan walked behind the rest of the party at some distance. After waiting a considerable length of time Mr. Murphy, Mr. Clancy, and the two women, surmising that Thistle and his companion had missed the path, set out on a search which was kept up until 2 a.m. On return to town this morning and the matter being reported, the horse police were dispatched to look for the missing people. Mr. Thistle resides on the Cove Road, and is a son of Mr. J. Thistle, Shoemaker. It is not likely that a tragedy has occurred, but the couple must have suffered considerable in the fog and rain which prevailed. Up to 2 p.m. to-day the police had not reported to headquarters.

Toronto, June 12.—(Canadian Press).—The annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers' Association will be held at Halifax on June 18 and 19. It is expected that about three hundred weekly newspapermen from all parts of Canada, many of whom will be accompanied by their wives, will gather to transact the business of the association and enjoy a brief holiday. Every province will be represented, also Newfoundland. On June 14 a party of 150 will travel from Toronto by special C.P.R. train to attend the convention. The party will stop, going or returning, at Fredericton, St. John, Digby, Grand Pre, Halifax, Sydney, New Glasgow, Truro, Amherst, Summerside, Charlottetown, Moncton and Quebec City. The return journey will be made via C.N.R.
