the New York Americans and the Canadiens of Montreal, on December 15 in the first match of the National Hockey League season in New Madison Square Gardens. The team winning the cup will hold it until the end of the season, when it will go to the championship team to be held for one year. It is a perpetual challenge cup and will be called the Prince of Wales trophy.

"It will be designed along the lines of one of the rarest old cups of England and will have on it the coat of arms of the Prince. Its value will be about \$2,500.

"There is a championship trophy in Canada now—the Stanley Cup, presented by Lord Stanley when he was Governor General of Canada. But that is the supreme prize of all. It is not the intention of the Prince that his cup shall displace the Stanley Cup. His is simply given as a prize in international competition in the National League.

"The trustees of the Prince of Wales Cup are William Foran, of Ottawa; Frank Calder, of Montreal; Colonel John S. Hammond, president of the New York Club; J. S. M. Hamilton, Deputy Fire Commissioner, and William T. Collins, President of the Board of Aldermen. They are now engaged in drawing up rules and regulations for the perpetuation of the cup."

BROKE OWN MARK.

DETROIT, Dec. 5.—A.P.—Agnes Geraghty, of the New York Swimming Association, clipped two seconds from her own world's record for the 100 yard breast-stroke competition in a 75-foot pool here last night, when she covered the distance in 23.3 seconds. Miss Geraghty established the previous mark last March in the Metropolitan Pool in New York.

AUSTRALIAN TENNIS CHAMPION ELIMINATED.

MELBOURNE, Dec. 5.—R. E. Schlesinger won the Victorian Lawn Tennis singles championship to-day by defeating Mr. Fitchett in straight sets at 6-3, 9-7, 6-3.

CHICAGO BEARS BEAT N.Y. GIANTS

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The Chicago Bears, professional football team, defeated the New York Giants, 19 to 7, at the Polo Grounds yesterday, before a crowd of 75,000. Red Grange made the feature play of the day when, in the last quarter, he intercepted a forward pass and ran 26 yards to a touchdown.

CALIF. PUTS A STOP TO CHANG- ING OVER.

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 2.—Any Canadian hockey team competing in an international league will not be considered eligible to compete in the play downs or elimination games governed by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, according to a ruling received by the Manitoba association from the Dominion organization. The Winnipeg Maroons, members of the newly formed Central Hockey Association of the United States Amateur League, automatically came under the ruling.

Canadian players also are subject to the rule that if they play in an international league they must remain one year out of hockey before being eligible to re-instatement in a Dominion team under the jurisdiction of the C.A.H.L.

OTTAWA SENATORS ARE DOMIN- ION RUGBY CHAMPS.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—The title of Dominion senior rugby champions was won by Ottawa Senators here Saturday, when they eliminated the Western threat for national honors by 24 to 1. Fighting a game losing fight the Winnipeg Tigers went under to Dave McCann's machine by a decisive margin.

BELGIANS WIN SIX DAY RACE.

New York, Dec. 6.—Alphonse Goossens and Gerard Debaets, the Belgian team, last night won the six-day bicycle race in Madison Square Gardens through a desperate sprint in the last 20 minutes which lapped Reggie McNamara and Franco Georgetti.

Diving to 500ft.

GERMAN HELP IN M 1 SEARCH— THEIR APPARATUS DE- SCRIBED.

The following description of the German diving apparatus which has been rushed from Kiel in a British destroyer to assist in the search for the lost submarine M 1 is taken from the Observer:

There are no means at present of diving beyond depths of 150ft. to 180ft., except by a special deep-sea diving equipment manufactured at Kiel. As M 1 lies at a depth of over 240ft., it would be impossible to get to the wreck except by the use of this apparatus.

Considerable risk attaches to the attempt about to be made, inasmuch as the apparatus has been only recently perfected, and as yet there has not been sufficient experience gained in the practical use of the equipment on the high seas to insure the divers against the many unforeseen risks and dangers that may arise, especially at this season of the year, when such heavy seas are running.

The armored deep-sea diving apparatus may be compared in its working to a submarine. It consists mainly of a rigid diving suit made of aluminum alloy, and strongly resembles in appearance a suit of mediæval armor.

The greatest difficulty in manufacturing the apparatus has been to make the joints perfectly flexible, so that a man can walk easily, use his arms freely, and at the same time be able to stand a pressure up to 25 atmospheres, which would correspond to the pressure of a depth of 750 feet. Practical use of the apparatus has been made up to a depth of 500 feet.

His Own Air Supply

Attached to the outside of the apparatus are several tanks, which are filled with water in order to give the necessary weight to the diver. When he wants to rise, these tanks are blown out by means of the compressed oxygen stored inside and controlled by the diver.

The internal mechanism also resembles a submarine in many respects. The diver does not depend on any air from above, as he has with him a sufficient quantity of oxygen to last for three hours. The carbonic acid exhaled is absorbed by special cartridges, as used in submarines.

An important and special feature of the new apparatus is that the diver always has a normal pressure of air atmosphere, while the pressure of water increases by an atmosphere for every 30ft. in depth. The diver working at a depth of 500ft., as practical trials have proved, does not suffer any inconvenience and comes out of the apparatus as fresh as he entered it.

The diver in the ordinary rubber suit requires about three-quarters of an hour to be lowered or raised slowly, in order to enable his body to adapt itself to the increasing or diminishing pressure. The new apparatus can go down to a depth three times greater in two minutes, and can come up at the same speed.

3 Telephone Wires.

The diver retains communication with the vessel from which he descends by means of a steel cable sufficiently strong to raise and lower him. This cable contains three independent telephone wires. In case the connecting cable should become entangled in some obstacle and the diver is unable to clear it, he can detach the cable from inside the apparatus.

\$4,680 for a Steer

PRINCE OF WALES, KING OF THE FAIRIES, SOLD FOR \$10,050.

CHICAGO, December 3.—King of the Fairies, champion short horn bull of the world, exhibited at the International Livestock and Horse Show here by the Prince of Wales, was sold for \$10,050 this afternoon, to Frank C. Baker, Kansas City, Mo., owner of the Baker short horn farm. The animal is five years old, and weighs 2,500 lbs.

King Jones was sold at \$3 a pound, a total of \$4,680—the highest price paid for a grand champion. The steer weighed 1,560 pounds, and was purchased by Armour & Company.

The animal, a two-year-old Aberdeen Angus, was owned by Iowa State College. The prize carload of cattle—15 head—sold for 43 cents a pound on foot—a total of \$6,722.50.

Green Meadow Footstep, Clydesdale station, owned by the University of Saskatchewan, Canada, is now the king of the American Clydesdales. The animal took the senior and grand championships at both the United States and Canadian Expositions.

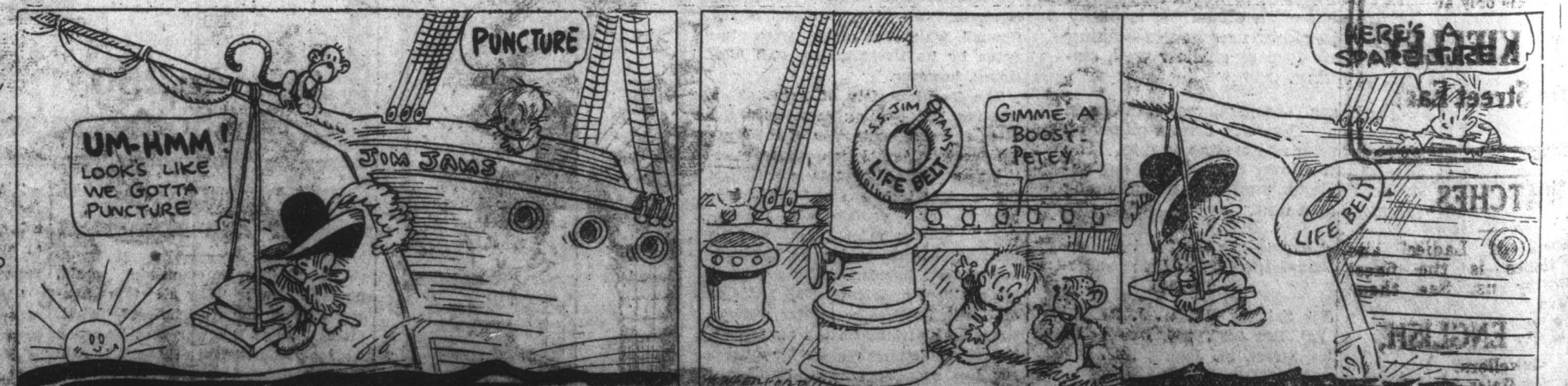
