Marines From Foreign Fleets on the Move Towards Pekin.

They Are All Acting Under the British Admiral-Foreigners Are Repairing the Railroad From Tien Tsin to Pekin -Telegraph Lines Cut - Empress-Dowager Seeks Russian Protection-A Re-

London, June 12.—(3 a.m.) — The last message out of Pekin to reach London left there yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, by way of Russian telegraph, through Manchuria, the Tien Tsin line being cut. It is as follows: "Gen. Tung, a Mohametan, extremely hostile to foreigners, arrived this morning and had a long conference with Prince Tuan, father of the heir-apparent, who is seemingof the heir-apparent, who is seeming by friendly to the Boxers. Prince Tue has been appointed chief of the Foeign Office over Prince Ching, who more friendly towards the foreign-

'The despatch of more marines was in response to a telegram from the Ministers to the consuls at Tien Tsin for additional troops. Conveyances have left Pekin to meet the troops

coming by the first train.

"The arrival of the Empress-Dowager has rendered the city somewhat more quiet than it had been recently.

"At Tien Tsin the Viceroy finally consented to furnish transports for a relief tere of 40% under a hourism reliof force of 400 under an American commander. The partial restoration of the railway is expected to be ef-fected by to-morrow. More massa-cres of Christians are reported."

Shanghai, under yesterday's date, cables that there has been strong street fighting in Pekin since early Sunday afternoon. A Crisis Imminent

The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, in a despatch dat-ed yesterday kt 1.40 p. m., says: Reports from the Yun Nan Fu district say that the French Minister has telegraphd that a crisis is im-minent, and that he is advising all foreigners to evacuate Yun Nan. All the telegrams indicate that the situation has not in the least im-proved. On the contrary, the dis-order has spread from the neighbor-hood of Pekin to the capital itself, hood of Pekin to the capital itself, which is growing turbulent in antiforeign dominions. In addition to the burning of the Pekin Club, the secretary of the Belgian Legation has been roughly handled in the streets. Hostile crowds continue to demonstrate against the legations. Two thousand international troops are approaching the city, and the advance guard is due to arrive to-day vance guard is due to arrive to-day (Tuesday).

BRITAIN TAKING THE LEAD. Russian and French Marines Are Acting

Under British Officers. Tien Tsin, June 11.—The captain in charge of the British defences here commandeered a third special train yesterday, and a fourth to-day, for the transport of 218 Russians and wo guns and 62 French marin with stores, and one gun for the British. The international forces are near Lang Fong. 40 miles from Pekin, but it is doubtful if they reach the capital before Tucsday.

Russia Will Act Independently.

New York, June 12. — A despatch from London from The Mail's correspondent at St. Petersburg, says there is not the least doubt that Russia's intentions are to act independently of other powers, even if momentarily seeming to be in accord with them.

Present a United Front. Paris, June 12 .- In the Chamber of Deputies yesterday afternoon the Minister of Foreign Affairs, M. Delcasse, said regarding the Chinese in-

surrection:
"A community of danger dictates to the powers their resolutions. I wish to set aside all questions of divergent views among them. What I affirm is that the surest guarantee of safety for each is a united front. If the Chinese Government does not seek to repress the insureection, of which it appears neither alarmed nor even surprised, it must expect new and grave misfortunes. I have placed at the disposition of the French Minister all our naval forces in Chinese waters, and have instructed him to keep in constant communication with his diplomatic colleague. his diplomatic colleagues, among whom the most complete accord has not ceased to reign. The legations have just notified the Government of China and the Dowager-Empress tha an end must be put to this peril which menaces the empire and Euro-pean interests, otherwise the powers will act for themselves."

A Complete Understanding In response to another inquiry, M. Delcasse laid stress on the fact that the most complete understanding exsted between the powers for the de-fence of Europeans and the legations.




