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WHY LAMP CHIMNEYS BREAK The Philosophy of Those Unplea

Ever since glass was invented some means of overcoming its brittleness has been sought. Housewives who still use lamps will hail with joy some process that will make lamp chimneys less liable to break from atmospheric influences. Chimneys have a disagreeable habit of breaking just when you don't expect them to, and almost invariably when there isn't another one in the house. Much ingenuity has been spent to secure unbreakable lamp chimneys, but with comparatively littly success. When the chimneys with the scallops on top were produced it was thought that the problem had been solved. It was supposed that the creases would afford more opportunity for expansion than the straigh edge but some way or other the scheme did work. The whole question of brittlendepends upon the molecular structure of glass. The glass in the first step of manufacture is melted. If cooled suddenly the molecules do not settle where there will be the least tension, but where there will be the least tension, but where there is the greatest. This is prettily illustrated by drooping a piece of melted glass in cold water. It assumes a round shape with a little tail and the whole thing flies to powder, sometimes making a report like a gun cap. The theory is that while the out side is cooled quickly and in granular crystals the inside is less quickly cooled, and settlesin other forms, making a surface tension. Disturb the outer shell and the tension is relieved, all flying to powder. It is the same thing in chinneys. The process of annealing is the converse of tempering. The glass, when hot, is put in ovens and allowed to cool very slowly, usually taking a week to complete the process. The thicker the glass is the longer it takes. The thicker the glass is the longer it takes. From all this housewives can get some points on how to get chimneys that will last. First, you can't tell by the color, as that depends on the chemical constituents and not on the grain. Of a box of chimneys the clearist are usually broken the easiest. The thick ones are usually broken easier than the thin ones, as their surface tension is greater. That is to say, an atmospheric change will break them easier. When you get your chimneys put them in warm water or oil, bring it slowly to the boiling point, and let them cool as slowly as possible. This will remedy to some extent imperfect annealing. Next, use burners that have the flame at the same distance from the walls of the chimney all around. Every time you light the lamp you affect the annealing, so turn them up slowly, and turn them down slower yet. In course of time any chimney is doomed to break, as the annealing becomes less perfect all the time, and a repetition of the boiling process will tend to obviate it. Buy chimneys that are regular in shape. All these plans will help, but they won't cure.

How to Make Pens Last. One of the chief woes of the ready writer, be he clerk or what not, consists in the fact that he no sooner gets a pen into good working order than it, like the "dear gazelle," comes to an untimely end from the corrosion caused by the ink. Life is not long enough to use and mend quills, nor to apply with delicate firmness the pen-wiper to a steel one. But some genius has now hit on a solution of the difficulty which has the merit of the most extreme simplicity. In many offices, we are informed, a potato is used instead of a pen-wiper. The juicy tuber holds the pen steady, removes at once all ink from the nib, and prevents, or at least very greatly delays the process of corrosion, and spares many a well-loved pen to a ripe old age.
