The Venezuelan Arbitrators Have

Been Chosen. And the Treaty Signed by Representatives of Britain and the United

States. Washington, D. C., Feb. 3.-The delay in completing the Venezueian treaty was caused by the difficulty in making up the personnel of the arbitral commission, not so much from objections to persons nominated by either sides as from the trouble experienced in arranging the tribunal so as to interfere as little as possible with the important routine work of the Supreme Court of the United States and Great Britain, from which bodies four of the arbitrators are drawn. Notice, however, was received by cable this morning from London that the Privy Council had finally onfirmed the selections made.

The four arbitrators, it is understood, will be Chief Justice Fuller and Justice Brewer, of the United States Supreme Court, and Lord Herschell and Sir Richard Henn Collins, Knight. Justice of her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature. The fifth arbitrator in case of need will be named

by King Oscar. By the terms of the treaty the agents of the two Governments, Great Britain and Venezuela, must deliver the complete cases at Paris, where the arbitration tribunal will meet, within eight months of the ratification of the treaty, with three months additional allowed for the submission of the counter cases, so that the entire arbitration probably will occupy a year

London, Feb. 3.—Baron Herschell, who was Lord Chancellor in the Rosebery Cabinet, and Justice Richard Henn Collins, Q.C., of the High Court of Justice, have been selected as the British members of the Venezuelan arbitration commission. # BRITISH BYE-ELECTION.

A Tory Majority Cut Down by 1,703 Votes, London, Feb. 2.—The election held yesterday in the Rolford division of Essex, for a member of Parliament to succeed Mr. Money-Wigram (Con.), who recently resigned his seat, resulted in the return of Mr. Louis Sinclair (Con.), thus retaining for the Govern-ment a seat which had returned a Liberal from 1885 until the general elec-tion of 1895, when Mr. Money-Wigram defeated the Liberal candidate by 1.-828 votes. The polling yesterday was as follows: Mr. Louis Sinclair (Con.) 8.156, and Mr. Raphael (Lib.) 8.031; Consavative majority 18.031; Conservative majority 125. Consequently there has been a falling-off of 1,703 votes for the Conservatives in
